HE KILLED THE "TWEED RING."
 New York, Aug. 24.—John Foley, who brought the famous injunction suit which ended in the rout of the "Tweed Ring" is dead. His health was shattered 20 years ago by his persistent fight for good government. Beginning with his election as a supervisor in 1880 he started a single-handed fight against "Boss" Tweed and did not let up until the famous ring was swept away. He was born in Ireland in 1834, and came to America when nine years old.

SPLENDID ART VENTURE
PAINTERS

Gallery at Dominion Fair Will Contain the Very Best Works.

Among the numerous pictures to be seen at the art gallery at the Dominion Exhibition will be the following choice works of past and present Canadian artists: Robert Harris, president of C.A.S., sends several fine figure subjects, among them "The Eastern Merchant," and a portrait of Mrs. Harris; W. Brynmor, Montreal, pictures of children, water color on canvas; William Hope, Montreal, sends two, which are loaned by Sir William Van Horne, and Sir Thomas Shaugnessy, "Scenes Near Eastport, on the Coast of Maine," E. Dymond, portrait of late C. E. J. Porteous, Montreal, several delicate studies by the late J. M. Barnsley. Two of the late Paul Lee,—"Venetian Baths," from the National Gallery, Ottawa, and "The Artist's Studio," from the collection of Byron E. Walker. Honer Watson has four strong storm effects in oil.

Among others, works of the following late artists will be seen: Wyatt Eaton, C. Jacobs, and Adolph Vogt. George Reid sends "A Visit to the Art Museum," J. W. L. Forster, portrait of Earl Robert, R. W. Grier, "Beret," which won the gold medal at the Paris Salon in 1890; portrait of the late Charles Grier, L.R.C.P.; portrait of Rev. Prof. William Clarke of Trinity College, shown for the first time; Charles Moss, "Goose Girl," F. Brownell, Ottawa, "Sovereign," which appeared at the Royal Academy, Ottawa, this spring, and was purchased by C. J. Harris of Barnfield; water color collection of Daniel Power, among them two large glass pieces; collection of works by John A. Fraser, founder of the Ontario Society of Artists, from the collections of Sir William Van Horne and R. V. Ellis. F. H. Bridgen has several landscapes, C. M. Manly, president Ontario Society of Artists, "Glorious of the Year," and "Field Flowers"; R. F. Gagen shows "Deep Sea Fishers," which was purchased by the government, also pictures of Rocky Mountain scenery. L. R. O'Brien, first president R.C.A., shows "Out in the Night," a large water color, also Hon. George Cox; W. E. Atkinson, water colors of a Dutch type.

Among the numerous drawings, designs, book illustrations and magazine work are some by F. Simpson Colborne, illustrating scenes in the "Habitant," by Drummond, and several designs for bookbinding and book plates. One of the largest pieces of sculpture is a statue by Philippe Jacques, called "Sans Merci," depicting a struggle between some early settlers and wolves, which are attacking them.

PUBLIC AMUSEMENTS.

Shea's couldn't seat all the crowd that wanted to see the "Dead End" bill at the popular "Youngster" vaudeville house last night. Many were content to stand and scores went away to come later in the week-end. The bill varied and in its entirety seemed to please everyone. Pat Rooney and Emma Francis have a lively dancing and semi-acrobatic performance that was one of the hits of the show. Tom Lewis and Sam Ryan caused much amount of laughter in their skit. "The Wireless Telephone," that it is not a novelty. The Great Fulgora is a surprisingly quick change act, and his presentation by tableaux of the surrender of Lee to Grant is a clever conception of a superbly given play. Arrives in New York.
 Cable advices received yesterday from London say that the "Coldstream Guards" Band must not cross the border into the United States during their coming tour. It was thought possible that they might visit the border cities of Detroit and Buffalo, so as to give the large number of Canadians in those cities and the immediate vicinity along the border an opportunity to hear them, but the regiment's authorities, after consulting with the War office, have decided that leave to visit Canada cannot be construed so as to admit of the band visiting the United States. It is understood that the reason given is that the army regulations do not permit of either soldiers or going into foreign limits in a representative capacity. The visit of the Coldstream Guards' Band will therefore be confined to Canada, and the director of the tour Stewart Houston is now busy arranging the dates. The band will come direct to Toronto, and will give their first concert at Massey Hall on Monday afternoon and evening, Sept. 2, and at the Academy of Music, appearing at the Exhibition on the morning and afternoon of Sept. 3. The following cities in Western Ontario will be visited: Sept. 9, Hamilton; Sept. 10, Guelph, afternoon, Brantford, evening; Sept. 11, Simcoe, afternoon, Woodstock, evening; Sept. 12, Windsor, afternoon and evening; Sept. 13, Chatham, afternoon, St. Thomas, evening; Sept. 15, Berlin, afternoon, Stratford, evening; Sept. 16, London, afternoon and evening. The band will then proceed east, and will visit Niagara, Buffalo, Belleville, Kingston, Ottawa, Montreal, Quebec, Sherbrooke and the Maritime Provinces. The sale of seats will begin at Massey Hall on Friday morning.

 New York, Aug. 24.—Charles Warner, the English actor of melodrama, who will make his professional debut in the country at the Academy of Music next month, arrived on the New York yesterday. He has played "Drink" 5000 times.
