A Bad Smashup

Which Might Have Resulted More Seriously.

A Buggy Broken—A Horse Badly Hurt and a Young Girl Narrowly Escapes Serious Injury.

About 8 o'clock Saturday night, on the Pipe Line road, at Woodland Cemetery, Mr. Chas. Armstrong, of Dayton, Ohio, formerly of this city, which he is now visiting, accompanied by a young niece, was driving towards the city, when in the darkness he suddenly came into collision with a horse and buggy driven by Mr. John Craven, of Woodbank, going in the opposite direction.

It appears that Mr. Craven and another party unknown were speeding their horses, and the way home, and Mr. Armstrong, in the darkness, was unable to get out of the way. Craven's horse plunged into the ditch, the shoulder of the animal striking the young girl heavily on the chest. In the tangle of horses, rigs and occupants, the animals were fortunately brought under control. It was found that Armstrong's buggy was pretty well damaged, while one of the shafts entered the side of the chest of Craven's horse and passed out behind the front leg. The animal was unable to walk, and was probably seriously disabled.

The young girl complained of great pain in the chest, and Armstrong's horse was hitched to Craven's buggy, and she was driven to Dr. Ferguson's office, South London. She was found to be bruised and swollen where she was struck on the chest, but no ribs were broken, and the doctor thought she had not suffered any serious injury. The third party drove off without even waiting to see what had happened. He will doubtless be careful now not to make himself known, as his conduct would merit the reproach of the public.

—Sergeant Copeland, a popular member of Wolsley Barracks, who left for Norwich on a three months' leave of absence a short while ago, has returned to the officers of the school informing them of the death of his father. He has been granted an additional two months' leave in consequence. He has the hearty sympathy of his comrades in his bereavement.

—Miss Clara Macklin, who has qualified herself for missionary work in the Northwest, was given a formal farewell at Stratford Friday night. Addresses were delivered by the Bishop of Huron and the rector, Rev. D. Williams. It is only a few days ago since Dr. Daisy Macklin.

The only daughter of Mr. Wm. Artz, of Elmira, N.Y., died very suddenly yesterday. She was a bright little girl, 6 years of age, and a short while ago, death resulting from inflammation. The bereaved parents have the sympathy of a large circle of friends in the loss of their little one, who was loved by all who knew her. The funeral will leave the family residence at 4 o'clock this afternoon.

AMONG THE PRESBYTERIANS.

News From Dr. McKay, of Formosa—Memorial of the Late Rev. D. J. Macdonnell—Honour for Rev. Dr. Caven.

The Westminster has the following: Rev. Principal Caven will represent Knox College at the great celebration at Princeton during this month, when the famous college will be proclaimed a university.

A letter comes from Rev. Dr. McKay, Tamsui, Formosa. There has been trouble with the lower class of Japanese officials and the Chinese rebels. Several chapels and mission houses have been injured or destroyed, and others are still held by the contending parties. The missionaries and their families are in good health.

Preparations are well forward for the publication of a memoir of the late Rev. D. J. Macdonnell. It is said that his sister, Mrs. Robert Campbell, and Rev. Dr. Robert Campbell, of Montreal, and Prof. McCurdy, of Toronto University, will contribute the various biographical portions. A careful selection of sermons will be made and included in the volume.

It is also hinted that a memoir of the late Rev. John Ross, of Brandon, may be published next year. Mrs. Ross has been collecting materials for some time, and the idea is beginning to take shape. Mr. Ross was a unique character, whose name should not be forgotten. He was one of the figures in the debates before the union of 1857, and with the late Rev. Lachlan Macpherson, was one of the ablest men of the United Church. But he was a spiritual force rather than an ecclesiastic.

Workmen at Church.

City and Visiting Lodges Parade to Divine Service.

Doings in City Churches and Other Religious Organizations.

The Bishop of Huron Speaks Strongly on Giving—The First Methodist Church Opening—Various Church Notes.

The members of the A. O. U. W. as might be judged from the name of their order, act in unison. Yesterday they held their annual church parade, and the various city lodges, with the visiting lodges of Lambeth and Ilford, turned out in large numbers. They assembled at the Albion Block, Richmond Street, where the line was formed. The stalwart figure of the grand marshal, Louis Franks, was adorned with the full uniform of the order. The lodges in line were: No. 407, Grant, W. H. Morgan, master; No. 406, Westminster, O. Ellwood, master; No. 405, Electric, J. Armstrong, master; No. 367, Star, Wm. Blair, master; No. 331, Woodbine, T. Glover, master; No. 13, London, W. Shannon, master; No. 5, Fidelity, E. G. Gibson, master; No. 17, Lambeth, T. H. Kennedy, master; Ilford, Wm. Charlton, master.

The procession was headed by the Seventh Band, and at 3:30 the start was made. They proceeded to the Church of St. James the Evangelist, where divine service was conducted by Rev. W. T. Hill. The route lay along Dundas Street to Wellington, along Wellington through Victoria Park to Richmond, turning at St. James Street. As the line passed through the park the sight was particularly pleasing. Over 300 brethren were in the parade, and as a body of men were of exceptionally fine physique. They wore the badges of the order and the white gloves. While the men were entering the church the band played "Nearer, My God, to Thee," very impressively.

Rev. Mr. Hill chose for his text part of the 15th verse of chapter 2 of the Epistle to Timothy—"The workman needeth not to be ashamed." His sermon was brief, occupying less than twenty minutes, but very earnest and appropriate. The reverend band played it was a great pleasure to welcome the brothers of the A. O. U. W. to the church. He himself was a member, but their order was founded on the teachings of Christ and of the apostle after whom the church was named. The order comprised 32,000 members, and was not measured by financial strength but since its incorporation \$5,000,000 had been paid out to the widows and orphans. The order was good outside of figures. It was helpful to build up the edifice of the Great Master Workman—the grand edifice of the brotherhood of man—the carrying out to every right-thinking person and that is that it inculcates foresight—foresight which the order preaches and the pupil reiterates. Want of foresight was attended by death, ruin and destruction. The speaker could find nothing in the Word of God which taught him not to make provision for the future. He quoted: "If a man provide not for

the future, he is worse than an infidel."

INSPECTING THEIR NEW

At the close of yesterday morning's service in Wesley Hall, Rev. Dr. Dangle invited the congregation to go in and inspect their new building. The people gladly accepted, and while collectively admiring the substantial beauty of the edifice, individually hunted out their locations in the allotment of pews. The dedication of the new church will take place on Sunday morning next, when the trustees and building committee will be relieved of their onerous but successfully performed duties. Four Sabbaths will be devoted to opening services, and besides all the city ministers, Rev. Dr. Carman, Rev. Dr. Potts, and Rev. Mr. Millburn, the blind chaplain of the United States Congress, are to take part.

THE BISHOP ON GIVING.

The Bishop of Huron delivered a powerful and striking sermon on "Christian Giving" at St. James' Church, South London, last night, before a congregation that filled the edifice. The bishop dealt not only with the necessity, but with the manner of giving, and he exhorted the congregation to such extent when he received a quid pro quo in the form of an entertainment, a lecture, a something that appealed to their worldly senses. He made a strong plea for free will offering to God, and he exhorted the congregation to be not for such petty rewards as he had referred to.

preached at both services in St. Andrew's Church yesterday.

Rev. B. J. Mement, of London West, and Rev. R. Hobbs, of South London, changed pulpits yesterday morning.

The Hill Street E. L. of C. E. celebrated an anniversary yesterday. Rev. H. D. Moyer, of Thamesford, preached at the regular services, and a sunrise prayer meeting was also held.

Rev. W. J. Clark, of First Presbyterian Church, London, yesterday exchanged pulpits with Rev. E. Cockburn, M.A., of Paris. Mr. Clark lectured in Paris last night on "Some Types of Church Members."

The sermon at the First Congregational Church was preached last evening by Rev. A. P. McGregor, B.A., of Woodstock, president of the Ontario Christian Endeavorers. He described the recent provincial convention.

One week from next Sunday Dundas Street Methodist Church Sunday school anniversary will be held. The services will be conducted by Mr. Wm. Reynolds, Peoria, Ill., and Mrs. Ford, Troy, N. Y., well known Sunday school workers.

Tomorrow evening the delegates who attended the Dominion convention of Christian Endeavor at Ottawa will give their reports at Knox Church. Rev. Robert Johnston, Mr. H. J. Brown (president of the Local Union), Miss Kirkpatrick (superintendent of Junior work), and Mr. W. J. Doherty (provincial treasurer), are expected to be present, and a pleasant and profitable evening is expected.

The congregation of St. James' Presbyterian Church will this year depart from the old custom of giving a thanksgiving entertainment. They intend, instead, to give a thanksgiving dinner, which will be held on the evening of Thanksgiving Day.

On Sunday evening next the subject of Rev. M. P. Talling's address to his congregation will be "The Character of Jephthah." It will be remembered by those who have read the Field-Ingerson and Gladstone-Ingerson controversy that in these celebrated discussions the actions and character of Jephthah played a conspicuous part, particular stress being laid upon his pledge to the Lord, which ended in the sacrifice of his daughter.

The London District Association of the Latter Day Saints convened in St. Thomas on Friday. This association was organized four years ago with about one hundred members. The report presented shows a membership of 600, with a total attendance of 11,035 for the past eight months. The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Elder R. C. Evans, London, president; Elder G. C. Tomlinson, St. Marys, vice-president; Miss M. Campbell, Haysville, secretary; Miss Eva McMurdoo, Hopeville, treasurer. Elder R. C. Evans was elected delegate to the General Sunday School Association.

Yesterday was Communion Sunday in the King Street Presbyterian Church. The attendance at its table was the largest in the history of the congregation. This was the first communion since the induction of Mr. Wilson. The sermon was based on the question, "Ought not Christ to have suffered these things, and to have entered into his glory?" (Luke xxiv, 26). The speaker showed three reasons why it was necessary that Christ should suffer as he did: (1) In order that he might be the Saviour of prophecy—prophecy foretold for him a life of suffering; (2) to be a friend to sinners; he must know something of suffering himself; (3) to be man's substitute he must suffer. The sentence upon man was death, and he, taking man's place, must bear man's penalty. "Twenty-nine new members were added to the church roll."

BURGLARY IN ST. THOMAS

The Thief Gets Away With \$52—Smashed in the Door of the House.

Frank Hill, a carpenter employed at the Michigan Central shops, St. Thomas, and who resides on Lila Street, reported to the police that he was the victim of a daring robbery on Saturday morning. He states that at 1 o'clock Saturday morning he heard a noise, and on awakening found a man in his bedroom. The fellow pointed a revolver at his head and demanded his money. Hill grabbed the revolver and held it so the burglar could not shoot. While this was going on Mrs. Hill jumped out of the window and ran for help. The man then held off. Hill investigated, and found that his trousers, which he had hung up in the bedroom, were missing. He found them in the dining room, but \$52 that was in the pocket was gone. Mr. Hill is of the opinion that two men did the work. He thinks one held the revolver at his head while the other rifled his pockets. Entrance was effected to the house by breaking in the door.
