"Duration of marriage in the lifetime of the married persons seems, to a great extent to be dependent upon its form. Where monogamy prevails it is often ac companied by forms of promiscuity or by readily obtained divorce. Polygamy satisfies, to a certain extent, the desire for variety to which transiency of relation ship is often due.

Where an enduring form of marriage is prescribed, marriage tends to be lax-i. e. polygamous, where separation is more or less optional, it tends to be brittle. "Incidentally, let us note here, in illus tration of the brittle marriage, so-called time and trial marriages. In time mar-

riages a contract of marriage for a stated fixed number of days during the week (part-time marriage)—this is a lax rather than a brittle arrangement-or for a stated continuous period (term-marriage hand-fasting).
