

WILL BISHOP REJECT REPORT

Committee of Ontario Anglican
Church Favors Union
Movement.

Kingston, Ont., Nov. 20. — Recently while the Anglican mission board was meeting in London, Ont., the church's joint committee on church union appointed by the General Synod drafted its report. It has just been made public through the Ontario Churchman of this city. It is to this effect:

"The joint committee upon the subject of Christian union, appointed at the last general synod, has had under its consideration the communication of the joint committee of the Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregationalist communions on church union, addressed to the archbishops and bishops of the Church of England in Canada and submitted to the committee on Christian union by the Episcopal members of the committee.

"The committee is impressed with the earnestness and spirit of the invitation and gravity of the subject, and remembers the pronouncement of the last Lambeth conference regarding the house of bishops of all Canada, that the Anglican communion to appoint committees, and to watch for and originate opportunities of united prayer and mutual conference between representatives of different Christian bodies. The committee respectfully suggests to the house of bishops of all Canada, that the latter should name a suitable delegation to participate in the general union movement, referred to in the communication, it being understood that neither the delegates who the house of bishops may appoint, nor the house of bishops itself, is committed in advance to what has already been done by the aforementioned three communions, and it being also understood that no action binding upon the church can be taken except by the General Synod. The committee on union places itself at the disposal of the house of bishops for the purposes of the delegation.

"Moreover, the committee is of opinion that there is no serious obstacle to union as regards the first three articles of the Lambeth Quadrilateral and believes that the time has come when an earnest effort should be made to find out the possibility of the acceptance by these communions of the historic episcopate. Considering that the causes which in bygone generations led to the formation of these separate communions were mainly two; results of political action and insufficient church ministrations and the attitude of the church to our separated brethren must recognize these causes. In reference to this, at page 111, L. C. 1897, this passage occurs:

"Finally, the committee believes that organic unity, such as contemplated, would result in a higher and truer conception and realization of the Christian ideal, and therefore that no opportunity should be lost in seeking it, and no sacrifice consistent with legitimate adherence to principle should be spared."

The Ontario Churchman approves the report and adds: "It is an interesting public document, and though there is scarcely a chance of its acceptance by their lordships, it will be historic in one sense, in that it expresses the broad spirit of a large proportion of the clergy and laity of the church. This spirit demands as a basis for good will be a broader courtesy to separated brethren than now exists."

The general synod's committee on union comprises the bishops of Quebec, Columbia, Qu'Appelle, Montreal and Huron. Deans Williams and Paget, Archdeacon Kaubach, Canon Richardson, Rev. A. L. Gentry, Simmonds and Sage, and Messrs. McDonald, Rogers, Lewis, Parnelle and Drewry.

The American Sugar Refining Company was found guilty by a jury in the United States circuit court today of accepting rebates amounting to \$26,000 from the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad.

The New York Central recently was found guilty of giving rebates to the house of bishops of all Canada, and fined \$108,000.

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Mr. Choate and former Judge Alton B. Parker, for the American Sugar Refining Company, and United States District Attorney Simpson, for the Government, who appeared as counsel in the case today, argued the same lines as they did in the New York Central defense hearings.

The defense offered no testimony after Judge Holt's charge, the jury took the case, and, in accordance with the instructions of the court, returned a verdict of guilty.

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BRITISH - FRENCH ALLIANCE

Clemenceau Refuses to State Whether a Military Convention Exists.

Paris, Nov. 20. — Senator Guddin de Villaine created a sensation in the senate today by making a vicious attack on the foreign and interior policy of the Government.

After expressing regret at the fact that the Catholics had not the courage to reply to their persecutions as the terrorists did in Russia, M. de Villaine charged the Government with playing into the hands of Great Britain, and demanded to know whether the report had been signed between Great Britain and France as a prelude to the great adventure in which Foreign Minister Pichon had embarked with Premier Clemenceau, was true.

M. Clemenceau, in reply, after warmly defending M. Pichon and Gen. Picquart, announced that he would not say anything regarding the Franco-British understanding.

He did not believe that a military convention existed, but he declined to be drawn into a trap which would place him in the position of discouraging the hopes of all Frenchmen.

The senate then, by the great majority of 213 to 22 votes, rejected the interpretation and passed a vote of confidence in the Government.

London, Paris and Rome are equally doomed.

TRIAL MARRIAGES ARE ADVOCATED

New York Woman Has Some Radical Ideas in Regard to Matrimony.

New York, Nov. 20. — Not only sociologists, but the public in general is discussing with great interest and widely differing views today the book just off the press, entitled "The Family," of which Mrs. Elsie Clews Parsons, wife of representative Herbert Parsons, of this city, is the author. Her advocacy of time and trial marriages as a means of remedying social evils is set forth in the book in very striking manner.

Mrs. Parsons is the daughter of Henry Clews, a well-known banker. She is a doctor of philosophy, a Hartley House fellow, and for six years was a lecturer in sociology at Barnard college. Her husband is prominent in politics, being chairman of the Republican county committee. She is on terms of intimacy with President Roosevelt.

The book which has caused so much discussion, consists of four lectures. It is a comprehensive, painstaking history of the family relations from ancient times to the present day.

Questioned concerning her object in putting forward such views on matrimony, Mrs. Parsons said that it is merely a surmise to advocate marriages of such a character. She said she was ill, and refused to be interviewed at length.

In her book she says: "It would, therefore, seem well from this point of view to encourage early trial marriages, the relation to be entered into with a view to permanency, but with the privilege of breaking it if proved unsuccessul and, in the absence of offspring, without suffering any great degree of public condemnation."

"The dogma that marriage is an unquestionable sacrament," the author declared, "and the dictum that it is merely a survival of a past form of property holdings are both shams."

"Duration of marriage in the lifetime of the married persons seems, to a great extent, to be dependent upon the variety to which monogamy prevails. It is often accompanied by forms of promiscuity or by readily obtained divorce. Polygamy satisfies, to a certain extent, the desire for variety to which transiency of relationship is often due."

"In this connection Sir John Lubbock makes an enlightening distinction between lax and brittle marriage. Where an enduring form of marriage is prescribed, marriage tends to be lax—i. e., polygamous, where separation is more or less optional, it tends to be brittle.

"Incidentally, let us note here, in illustration of the brittle marriage, so-called time and trial marriages. In time marriages a contract of marriage for a stated time is made. The time may be for a fixed number of days during the week (part-time marriage)—this is a lax rather than a brittle arrangement—or for a stated continuous period (term-marriage, hand-fastings). At the end of the stated period the relation may or may not be made permanent."

A variety of time marriage, it being distinctly agreed that the relationship may be dissolved at any time."

MOUNTAINS OF THE MOON

Region in Africa Wrapped in Mystery for Ages Is Now Being Explored.

London, Nov. 19. — Many old legends cluster about the snowy peaks of the Mountains of the Moon in Africa, and Sir Harry Johnston expresses the opinion that the last discovered of all the great mountains of the Dark Continent, Ruwenzori, recently surmounted by the Duke of Abruzzi, was the principal source of the legends of those mountains — mountains of incredible height, with a moonlike, mottled aspect of snow and rock appearing occasionally like undulating views from the heavens, cut off from the forests and plains by swaths of clouds; mountains whose copious streams united to form the great lakes that were the source of the Nile.

The first beginnings of these legends may have reached the early dynasties of the Mediterranean through Egypt. Five thousand years ago, in all probability, the ancient Egyptians had got into touch commercially with the negroes of the Egyptian Sudan and the valley of the White Nile as well as with Abyssinia.

A negro type of intermediary had sprung up from the contrast between the Caucasian Egyptian and the Nilotic negroes, who had pushed his journey in search of slaves, ivory, incense and other products of the Sudan far southward to the verge of the equatorial forests. Perhaps even an occasional Egyptian refugee criminal or slave merchant may have accompanied his negro partners on such expeditions.

In any event, communications had been opened up between the negroes of Central Africa and the civilized people on the shores of the Mediterranean and, doubtless, through this channel were carried those legends of the Mountains of the Moon which, according to this authority, attained their greatest consistency and verisimilitude in the first century after Christ.

For many centuries after the Roman Empire began to decline all interest in the Mountains of the Moon ceased and only revived when the travels and conquests of the Arabs once more brought people of some degree of civilization and culture into contact with tropical Africa.

mitted information regarding the "Jabal-Kunn," as they called these mountains, to the philosophers of Europe in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries and thus these snow peaks of equatorial Africa reappeared on the world's maps. Little was learned about these mountains, however, until the early '80s of the last century, when Mount Kenia, which had been discovered many decades before by Krapf, a Wurttemberg missionary, was rediscovered, carefully located and photographed.

In August, 1900, Sir Harry, in company with two other men, reached the snow and ice of Ruwenzori on the Muboko glacier, but it was not until the present summer that the summit was reached. "Now," he says, "in all probability the era of discovery, geographical and zoological, on this wonderful mountain range in the very heart of equatorial Africa, has only just begun."

SEEKS DEATH ON PYRE

Declares 29 Cities Will Perish When Earth's Axis Is Straightened.

Chicago, Nov. 20. — Possessed by the idea that eternal damnation for her dead son and herself was to be awarded only by self-immolation, Mrs. Stella Bowman, 34 North California avenue, kindled a sacrificial fire in her home yesterday morning by saturating a bed with kerosene, lying on it and then applying a lighted match to it. She was dragged uninjured from the bed by firemen, who responded to a call from neighbors who had been attracted by the mantel outcries of the woman, uttered as she prepared the sacrifice. In her right hand were clasped bills amounting to \$50, the savings of herself and her husband. The fire was extinguished with slight damage to the premises.

At the Desplaines street police station, whither the woman was taken to remain a prisoner awaiting inquiry as to her sanity, she explained that her son died last March and that in a dream it had been revealed to her that he was suffering eternal torment and that to save him and herself from punishment after death she must make of herself a burnt offering.

The officials took these promises to pay to an amount aggregating \$50,000 from nearly 1,000 persons.
