GRAND JURY RETURNS TRUE BILLS AGAINST HOGAN AND FORTHEY

Biddulph Man Charged With Forgery on Four Counts.

The summer sittings of the general sessions of the peace opened at 2 o'clock yesterday afternoon before Judge Macbeth.

The grand jury after being out for some time returned true bills in the cases of Michael Hogan, charged with forgery on four counts, and Earl Fortthey, charged with assault occasioning great bodily harm.

The charge of obtaining money under false pretences laid against William Gushue, was the only case heard yesterday afternoon, the grand jury having returned a true bill in his case in December last.

The case was heard in part, the witnesses for the defence to be brought on today, when the case resumes at 2:30 o'clock.

Gushue is charged with obtaining various sums of money from persons of his nationality by representing to them that his assets were greater and his liabilities less than they actually were. It is also charged that he failed to disclose some of the liabilities.

The following witnesses were heard at yesterday afternoon's session—Samuel P. Corwell, valuator, on behalf of the Imperial Bank; Blanche, Snieszko, Peter Sawka, John Baabak, Felix Wolatark, Mary Netiz, and Peter Mitolky.

With the number of witnesses yet to be heard the case will run on for some hours yet today.

The following cases were settled before the parties: Helm vs. C. P. R.; Ross vs. London and Lake Erie Railway; Needham vs. C. N. R.; and Royal Bank vs. Williams.

The action of Woodburn Milling Company vs. Niagara Grain Company was postponed until the December sittings.

DISABLED SOLDIERS OF WHOLE DISTRICT WILL TRAIN HERE

Technical Schools Will Be Utilized to Full Capacity.

SUGGEST OCCUPATIONS

Men Will Be Taught Trades They Are Best Fitted For.

The appointment of Principal H. H. Beal as director in charge of vocational training for soldiers for this district is a distinct compliment to his efficiency and his splendid work on behalf of technical education in this city. That he will do even better work is the opinion of his friends and the board of education.

The duties of the vocational officer will be of a very important character. He is expected to help select the disabled soldiers to select a new occupation and then supervise his re-education for that occupation.

The Government has undertaken to do this, and it is the duty of the vocational officer to see that the disabled soldiers are properly re-educated for their former occupations or for new ones. The vocational officer will be in charge of the vocational training board of three members, in each centre where returned soldiers are convalescing, a disabled soldier's training board of three members will be appointed by the military hospitals commission at Ottawa.

Go into Each Case.

This board consists of a vocational officer, who is chairman of the board, one member representing the Provincial Soldiers' Aid Commission, and a medical officer. The duties of this board are to go through into the case of each returned soldier and suggest the occupation for which, under his disability, he should be trained.

The board will then report to the military hospitals commission at Ottawa. The vocational officer will be in charge of the vocational training board of three members, in each centre where returned soldiers are convalescing, a disabled soldier's training board of three members will be appointed by the military hospitals commission at Ottawa.

Now Under Way.

The work of re-educating the soldiers is already under way. A large machine shop class is being fully instructed at the technical school. A class in automobile repairing is being opened this week. Arrangements are also being made to open classes in cabinet-making and shoe repairing in the near future. Returned soldiers suited for telegraph operators are being sent to Toronto where a very successful class is being conducted.

Technical schools, in the present technical school accommodation, is in a position to take its place in the important work of re-educating the disabled soldiers to re-enter a life of usefulness. The new technical school building will be completed with all possible haste as it will be hard to keep pace with the demand for this class of service. There is a distinct compliment to Principal Beal that he has been selected as vocational officer.

MOST INTERESTING WOMAN AT NATIONAL COUNCIL IS MRS. BOOMER OF LONDON

WINNIPEG, June 6.—Winnipeg papers are devoting much attention to a worthy delegate to the National Council of Women, Mrs. H. A. Boomer, president of the Local Council of Women, as being "the most interesting of able women attending the convention."

One paper states: "Her life has been one of important distinctions and varied experiences, and although well past four-score years, is still the most active member of the council, of which she was one of the earliest members."

Mrs. Boomer attends every session and oftentimes takes a leading part in the discussions. "Though an Englishwoman by birth, she is a Canadian by adoption."

At the point where the alabaster box of ointment, Mrs. (Rev.) R. R. McKay of Sarnia spoke interestingly on the work of the young ladies' circles.

A quiet hour of prayer at this point of the meeting was very helpful, and Miss Gannon followed with a solo, "I Gave My Life for Thee."

Miss Selman, missionary from India, spoke of her own work among the low-caste women of that large country, and told of their eagerness to hear the gospel message, and their loyalty to the faith.

The officers for the year were elected as follows: Mrs. (Rev.) R. R. McKay, president; Mrs. (Rev.) J. R. McKay, vice-president; Mrs. J. Baldwin of London, secretary; Mrs. (Rev.) A. C. Bingham of London, treasurer.

The evening meeting was opened by a song service, conducted by Rev. A. C. Bingham.

The director reported that the contributions from both circles and bands showed a satisfactory increase of nearly \$200. All the circles had reported, and showed a total membership of over 1,400.

Mrs. C. J. Cameron of Toronto spoke on home missions, and gave a vivid picture of the need of evangelistic work among the French-Canadians. "We differ from the French Roman Catholics on many fundamental points," she said, "especially the public schools, parochial system, right of private property. There should be one official language for the whole country, and the entire separation of church and state. Our principles must be maintained and propagated, and this is an important part of our home mission work. As Baptists we must assert ourselves and preach a whole gospel."

Rev. P. W. Philpot of Hamilton gave a spiritual address on the subject of "The Christian's Life." He pleaded for all to give themselves unreservedly to God in cheerful service.

MANY DELEGATIONS AT COUNTY COUNCIL REQUESTING GRANTS

Roads, Bridges and Schools Are Under Discussion.

ORGANIZE FARMERS CLUBS

Important Proposition Submitted by Roscoe Finn to Increase Production.

The members of the county council earned their salaries yesterday, having transacted business that required the calling of two sessions, an afternoon and a night sitting. The clock in the tower was striking eleven bells when the county council concluded their deliberations on many matters of importance. In the afternoon the council was called upon by six deputations, each asking for assistance for various purposes.

Deputations from the villages of Delaware, Belmont, Melbourne, and Thorncliffe asked that a grant be given towards the support of continuation schools in those communities.

County School Inspector Thompson outlined the needs and the advantages of the schools, and asked that the council grant \$2,500 for every \$1 granted by the Government.

The matter was referred to the educational committee.

The committee recommended that a grant on the \$150 basis be made to the continuation schools above-mentioned. Reeve Cousins of Belmont asked that a grant of \$2,500 be made to the Government, or on the \$2 basis.

Reeve Cousins, and thought that the council might make an exception in the case of Belmont, and grant an amount to that school twice that granted by the Government, or, in other words, \$5,000.

Councillor Harrison of Parkhill produced the statistics with respect to the school, and according to his interpretation, for the council to make grants to the school would be to make grants to the school, and not to the school, and would be contrary to the statute.
