THE BOYCOTT IN DENVER.

Departmental Stores and Newspapers Clash-The Press on Top.

Denver, Jan. 20.-The boycott of the newspapers of Denver, begun ten days ago by fourteen departmental stores, was ended last night by the unconditional surrender of the stores. The stores made the demand that the papers reduce their advertising rates 30 ting the wood and \$1 50 for cutting and per cent, or they would cease to advertise. The fight has stirred up the community greatly, the result being that the stores were almost forsaken by buyers, and the proprietors had to surrender or go out of the business. Labor unions have held meeting after meeting to contrive plans to spread the agitation and keep the people away from the departmental stores. At a late hour last night the newspaper offices were visited by a representative from each store. They acknowledged that they were beaten, and would resume their advertising contracts as soon as arrangements could be made.
