Former Well-Known Merchant of London Died at a Ripe Old Age.

RING DOOR BELLS OF CABINET MINISTERS

Suffragettes Adopt New and Novel Way of Securing a Hearing.

London, Jan. 30. — Having failed to reach King Edward yesterday during the ceremonies of the opening of Parliament, and as the House of Commons is effectively barred against them, the women suffragettes of England today adopted a new method of protesting against the fact that their majesty in his speech from the throne made no mention of their demands to be permitted to vote. The militant members of the organization formed themselves into several committees, which at the same hour today visited the homes of the various members of the cabinet for the purpose of asking them to use their influence to have the question of the woman's suffrage settled at this session. As none of the ministers would see them, the women demonstrated by ringing doorbells and delivering addresses from doorsteps.

The police were unprepared for this course of action, and noisy scenes were witnessed on several of the fashionable thoroughfares of London. The women eventually were dispersed after seven arrests had been made.

NO PART ENTIRELY MADE IN CANADA

Major Pym, Inspector of Small Arms, Testifies as to the Ross Rifle.

Ottawa, Jan. 29.—Major Pym, the imperial officer who has been acting as inspector of small arms for the militia department, was examined by the public accounts committee this morning. He denied that he had any feelings against the Ross Rifle Company because he was an Englishman, or for any other reason. He had declined to sign certificates as to 75 per cent of the cost of the rifles on which payments are advanced by the Government, because he could not tell accurately what the labor and material had cost.

Major Pym said that no part of the Ross rifle was made entirely in Canada, but admitted that the British Government imports the wood for its rifles, and it also imports its bayonets from abroad.

STOLID AND UNMOVED

Woodville Youth To Be Arraigned for Murder at Detroit.

Detroit, Mich., Jan. 29.—The police swore out a warrant here today for the arrest of Percy Boyne, formally charging him with slaying Mrs. Cornelia Welch, who was found beaten to death in her home about three weeks ago. The boy will be arraigned in the police court today for murder in the first degree.

Although she had been warned by the police not to interfere with her lover, the sweetheart of Boyne, a stenographer of prominent parents here, whose name is withheld, appeared at headquarters last night, and the pair had a tearful meeting. The stenographer is the same girl whose presentation of a Bible to the murdered woman broke him down and drew forth his complete confession. Boyne's cold-blooded description after he had decided to tell all to the police, of how he beat the aged woman into insensibility and calmly spent the night in a nearby hotel, made even the officers who took the 42-page confession shudder. The sophisticated youth is stolid and unmoved in his cell, and seems to have no thought of the terrible penalty he may have to suffer for his crime.

PUSSY AND THE GOLDFISH

A Catfish Story Containing Food for Thought and the Cat.

New York, Jan. 29.—This story ought to warm one up a bit. Dr. Cahill, chief of the Park River Dispensary, believes that animals think, reason, and even lay plans. Said he: "My small son had a globe in which a tiny goldfish swam. The globe, which was firmly fixed on an iron tripod so that it could not be overturned easily, held only about a pint. My household got a raving appetite for that fish. She sat and looked at it for hours at a time, but, of course, as often as she dipped her paw in the globe it got wet and she pulled it out.

Members of my family were much interested in watching her. The cat sat and sat and reasoned and reasoned and plotted. Finally the solution—excuse my technicalities—the solution came to her.

"She drank the water in the globe, then ate the fish."

GRIM SOUVENIRS

Friends to Have Pouches Made From Testator's Skin.

London, Jan. 29. — The friends of Mr. Henry Sullivan, a well-to-do New Yorker, will have some grim keepsakes of him when he has crossed the board.

Mr. Sullivan is a life-long "Unitarian," and in his will he instructs his solicitors "To have made out of my bones circular buttons of dimensions from one-half an inch to one inch in diameter, to have the skin of my body tanned and made into pouches; to have made out of such parts of my body as may be suitable strings for the violin, such as are usually designed cat-gut strings; and I do hereby further direct my said executors to have the said violin-strings adjusted to the body of a violin."

"I hereby give unto my beloved friend and clubmate, James Hayes, the buttons, violin-strings, and tanned skin made out of my body as aforesaid, the same to be by him distributed according to his discretion to my intimate friends."

Mr. Sullivan is convinced that there is good and useful material in the human body which should not be wasted, but utilized as souvenirs for friends. He does not believe, he says, in the foolish, unhygienic, and wasteful methods of burial, and he trusts that his example may be followed by many.

HOW SHOCKING

Kaiser's Soldiers Couldn't Tell Him History of the Hohenzollerns.

Berlin, Jan. 29.—Emperor William today reviewed the first regiment of the Guards at Potsdam, and after the men had marched past his master took the regiment in hand personally and drilled it for an hour.

At the conclusion of these exercises, Emperor William passed along in front of each individual recruit and questioned him, picking out and questioning subjects, but principally concerning German history. He asked one man if he knew the fable of the Schildhorn Monument in the Gneisswald. The man said he had never heard of the monument, whereupon the Emperor remarked that it would be a good thing for him to read more. Another recruit had the vaguest notions regarding the Princess of Venden.

The Emperor then asked a Pomeranian if he knew how the Hohenzollerns had come to the throne. This recruit was no better informed than his fellows, for he answered, "No, your majesty."

The Emperor then sent a number of officers of high rank into the lines among the soldiers and called on the recruits to pick out and name each corps, division and brigade commander present. This was done without mistake.

DEATH OF DR. W. O. KENNEDY.
St. Thomas, Jan. 29.—W. O. Kennedy, L.D.S., of Aylmer, died this forenoon after a long illness. In his 60th year. He leaves a widow and one son. Before going to Aylmer Mr. Kennedy practiced in Toronto.
