INGERSOLL, Dec. 18.—A letter re-ceived by Mr. and Mrs. William Moul-on from their son, Walter Moulton, ceived by Mr. and Mrs. William Moulton, Ingersoil's former star hockey player, relates his experience in the terrible explosion which occurred at Halifax. For over a year Walter Moulton has been a wireless operator on Canadian ships connected with the British mayy. He states that about two minutes before the explosion occurred he had his breakfast brought to him. When he felt the shock and heard the terrible explosion he was horrified to see the body of the boy who had brought him his breakfast frightfully mutilated. His right arm had been completely forn off and a large portion of the shoulder was gone. Going up on deck he found many of the crew dead, and as he hurriedly left the ship he was told to run, as another explosion was about to take place. On every side as they hurried away they saw bodies and the debris caused by the explosion. The writer stated he had a very narrow escape, as his cabin was destroyed. The ship he was on was only about a quarter of a mile from where the explosion occurred.
