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OLYMPIC GAMES MAY BE STAGED IN ROME, ITALY

Antwerp, Amsterdam and Berne Also Mentioned For Honors.

ROME, Saturday, March 8.—It is hoped to have the Olympic games of 1924 held in Rome, but no definite decision as to this has yet been taken. Premier Orlando was recently approached by the Italian Olympic committee and the question and a reply is expected from him within a few days.

First consideration here for the Olympic committee was stated today that no decision has yet been reached as to the place for holding of the games of the seventh Olympiad in 1924. The place will be decided on the occasion of the 25th anniversary of the revival of the Olympic games and the foundation of the International Olympic committee to be held at Lausanne on April 5 when the committee comprising Baron Pierre de Coubertin, its president, Baron Godefroy de Blonay of Switzerland, and Baron de Lavelly of Belgium, will render decisions.

Antwerp seems to be the favorite selection at present, with Amsterdam and Berne also mentioned for the honors. Rome has not been mentioned in committee circles. It was stated.
