Ontario Convention Approves of Higher Payments To Meet Costs.

CAN DISCUSS POLITICS

Delegates Accept Report For \$1,200 Minimum Total Disability Pension.

PETERBORO, March 18.—It was suggested this afternoon at the annual convention of the Provincial Great War Veterans' Association, that a newspaper be started in the interests of the Great War Veterans' Association, and a committee of newspapermen in attendance at the convention was appointed to look into the matter and report thereon. A number of resolutions were passed. One of two resolutions asked the Federal Government to investigate, by means of a commission or otherwise, the reason for the exodus of Canadians to the United States and to take steps to counteract his movement.

Another resolution asked the Government to "encourage the use and sale of Canadian-made goods, and thereby offset American competition." This was advocated not as a question of patriotic feeling, but as an economic one.

The abolition of all property qualifications in order to enable all citizens, including war veterans, to vote at municipal elections, was urged in a resolution.

Other resolutions were passed as follows: That the Government be requested to encourage reforestation and decrease by embargo shipments of Canadian timber to the United States; that the free treatment period for members of the Canadian Expeditionary Force be extended for three years; that an effort be made to encourage trade within the empire as a means of overcoming the adverse exchange rate; that minors who are taking or have taken vocational training courses be granted a similar bonus to that granted to other vocational students; that the

The delegates to the convention were gathered by the local branch of the Great War Veterans' Association at a theatre party tonight, followed by a dance in the convention hall.

The morning session was mainly occupied in dealing with the question of political action by the G. W. V. A. and the request for an increase in the pensions granted to soldiers and dependents.

By a decisive majority the convention approved of the proposal of the Dominion executive to amend the constitution to permit of discussion of political questions in local commands. An amendment to introduce political action was defeated.

The convention also went on record as approving of an increase in pensions to meet the increased cost of living, and also to provide more generous pensions for supply gun carriages and necessary rifles for a funeral party to Great War Veterans' Association branches automatically located.

After much discussion the delegates agreed to accept the report of the resolutions committee that \$1,200 be asked as a minimum total disability pension.

PARENTS OF WHITE GIRL ATTACK NEGRO IN HAMILTON COURT

Wild Scene Follows Decision Freeing Colored Man.

HAMILTON, March 18.—A wild scene occurred in police court this morning, when Robert Boyd, colored, charged with a revolting offence against a white girl of less than fourteen years of age, was found not guilty and given his liberty. When the magistrate made known his decision, the mother of the little girl seized a chair and hurled it across the courtroom at Boyd, as he was standing in the pen.

The chair missed the prisoner. The enraged mother, however, was not deterred by attempting to force her way to the dock, and the father joined her in the attempt to get at the prisoner. Sgt. Clark and several other constables intervened and for a full minute a battle royal raged. Boyd scuttled to the far end of the dock and made his escape from the room. The child's parents were overpowered and forced from the court. Six witnesses testified for the prosecution, including a doctor, who swore the girl gave birth to a colored child. The magistrate held, however, that there was no corroborative evidence, and dismissed the case.

MANY FARM SALES.

HYDE PARK, March 18.—Many farms have changed hands within the past few weeks, and sales of farm stock and implements are almost of daily occurrence.

The fourth concession, east of the village, has been in deplorable condition for either plowing or wheeling since the thaw started. Mr. Guest, roadmaster, had the drifts plowed out Wednesday, and in places vehicles have to drive through banks of snow almost like tunnels. However, several autos passed over the road Thursday for the first time since the heavy snowfall.

SCORES DELAY IN GOVT. ACTION AT KAPUSKASING

Commission Says Hearst Government Knew Conditions Twelve Months.

SHOULD PROVIDE WORK

Department of Labor Should Help Settlers To Obtain Employment.

TORONTO, March 18.—"The province has spent a large amount of money for very small returns, and the unsatisfactory conditions should have been dealt with at a much earlier date," says the report of the commission appointed by the Drury Government to investigate the conditions of the soldiers' settlement at Kapuskasing. The report was read to the government today. The commission was comprised of W. E. Nickle, K.C., Kingston; Col. John L. MacLennan, Hamilton; and Prof. Sharpe, New Lis-kard.

All the essential facts stated in the report, the commissioners say in their finding, "were known to those in authority at least twelve months ago and action should have been taken to deal with the situation, not only in the interests of the settlers, but also in the interests of the province as well."

General Lack of Care. "A visit to the colony leaves an impression of general untidiness and lack of care of detail. There was evidence that potatoes and flour were carelessly handled, entailing considerable loss. From the testimony of settlers themselves it is impossible to resist the conclusion that most of them spent money much more lavishly than pioneer conditions warranted."

The report finds that the fitness of the colonists for pioneer work was not sufficiently investigated before they were sent to Kapuskasing.

The commission recommends a revaluation of all houses and buildings in the colony, to determine whether or not an overcharge is found. Credit should be given. Settlers should be allowed to choose whether to remain in the colony or to leave. If they leave, transportation should be provided to any point in Ontario. These leaving should be allowed the value of their house, plus \$1,000 for the land cleared for the plow. From this should be deducted any indebtedness to the Government, and the balance paid in monthly installments of \$100. Farms left vacant should be available for transfer to settlers at outlying points.

KITCHENER'S OLDEST INHABITANT CELEBRATES HIS 90TH BIRTHDAY

KITCHENER, March 18.—Kitchener's oldest citizen, Ferdinand Walter, celebrated his 90th birthday today. He was former license inspector for Waterloo county and came to this locality in 1842. He ran for the Provincial Legislature in 1872, being defeated by the late I. E. Bowman. He was a member of the county council and the old town council for many years. Mr. Walter is hale and hearty and takes an active interest in city affairs, being a daily visitor to the business district.
