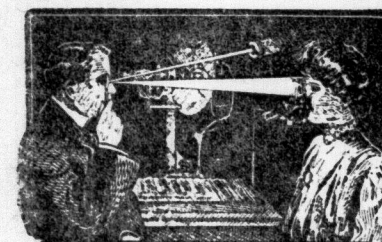

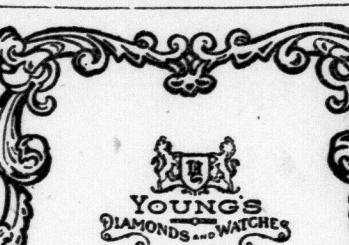

**ALL FIELD CROPS
MUCH IMPROVED
BY RECENT RAINS**

**Pasture Is Good and Milk Flow
Was Never Better.**

The following is a summary of the
weekly reports made by the agricultural
representatives to the Ontario depart-
ment of agriculture:

All field crops have been more or less
improved by the rains which have fallen
at intervals during the last three weeks.
Fall wheat has been lengthening in
stalk with the recent rains, but is still
decidedly below the average in height.
The absence of great heat during the
last week or so has helped the heads
to fill out well, and several representa-
tives express the hope of a generous
yield. Essex, Kent, Elgin and Hal-
dmand speak of the Heeslan fly as caus-
ing some trouble.

Spring grains are looking much bet-
ter than they did earlier in the season.
Essex and Kent report some oat fields
as already beginning to head.
All hay and pasture crops have picked
up wonderfully with the soaked soil, but
timothy and clover will be behind the
average in yield. Norfolk reports some
new hay already on the market. Alfalfa
has received the first cut and is giving
satisfaction, and sweet clover is also
said to be turning out well.

Corn, taking the province over, never
looked better at this date, even though
it has been more affected by insects than
in recent years.

Potatoes Doing Well.
Potatoes are doing nicely now, early
varieties being in blossom
except mangels are looking well, but
considerable of that crop had to be re-
sown to turnips. Lanark reports that
Canadian-grown root seed has given
good results this season.

Essex states that early cabbage are
being shipped in carload lots at \$3 a
bushel.
Peas for the canning factories are
making good growth in Prince Edward
County after a not very promising start,
but they will be later in pulling than in
other years. Other canning crops, such
as tomatoes, sweet corn and beans, are
also said to be doing well in that county.

The weather for getting out tomatoes
has been ideal, and any losses in field
plants are attributed to insects.
Strawberries on the whole are giving
a good yield, but prices are lower than
those of last season, as the first pickings
were inclined to be soft owing to rains
prevailing. During the past week
canners have been buying strawberries
as low as twelve cents a box in Norfolk.
Most of the other small fruit crops are
also promising well, as are most of the
orchard fruits.

Plenty of Pasture.
Live stock are now doing exceedingly
well on pasture and the milk flow was
never better. Veal calves are being
marketed at from 10 to 14 cents a pound.
Carleton states that 2-year-old calves
are selling at from \$10 to \$15 each. Peel
quotes milk cows as going at from \$140
to \$175 for choice, \$100 to \$130 for com-
mon, and \$70 to \$90 for common.

Cheese sold as follows about the lat-
ter part of the week: 1,350 boxes on the
London board at 23 1/2 cents a pound;
1,182 boxes on the Peterboro board at
23 7/8 cents a pound.
When butter made in Lanark County
has been disposed of at 45 1/2 cents a
pound at the factory.

Bacon hogs are selling at from \$18 to
\$19 a hundredweight, but too many of
them are being marketed light.

Elgin states that a number of sheep
and lambs are now going to market.
Peel says: "The supply of labor from
the immigration employment
bureau offices has been generous this
week; but generally speaking sufficient
labor is not available, especially capable
men, and some representatives state
that many farmers will have to do all
they can within themselves."

**ACTION OF A. F. OF L.
ACT OF DISCOURTESY,
SAY NEWSWRITERS**

**Resolution Resenting Recogni-
tion of Irish Republic Is
Passed.**

Strong dissent was expressed at
the regular meeting of the London
Newswriters' Union yesterday from
the recent action of the American Fed-
eration of Labor while in session at
Montreal in passing a resolution in
recognition of the so-called "Irish Re-
public," and demanding the with-
drawal of troops from Ireland.

The newswriters by a practically
unanimous vote passed a resolution
expressing disapproval of the discou-
rtesy shown by the A. F. of L. by such
a pronouncement while on British soil,
and expressing the opinion that such
action was no more justified than
would be interference by Great Britain
in the affairs of the United States or
the American Federation of Labor.

It was ordered that copies of the
resolution be sent to the London local
of the I. T. U. and to the secretary
of the I. T. U. at Indianapolis, U.S.A.,
and that the substance of it be pub-
lished in the local newspapers.

**BEAVERS WILL MEET
IN LONDON NEXT YEAR**

**Dr. L. S. Holmes Elected Head
of Organization at Annual
Meeting.**

Windsor, July 2.—The eighth annual
session of the Grand Lodge of Canadian
Order of Beavers was held in King
George Hall yesterday. Reports of the
year's work showed great progress,
both in membership and the number of
lodges instituted. Lodges have been in-
stituted at Toronto, Walkerville, Essex
and East London during the year.

M. W. Bro. W. G. R. Bartram was
presented by the grand lodge with a
silver engraved tea tray, the presenta-
tion being made by M. W. Bro. G. A.
Edwards of Windsor. The address was
made by W. Bro. A. D. Grube, and M.
W. Bro. Bartram made a suitable reply.

**IS SENT TO JAIL FOR
ASSAULT ON MOTHER**

**W. G. Murrell of Manor Park
Given Month by Squire
Chittick.**

William George Murrell of Manor
Park, aged 22 years, was convicted in
the county court Friday afternoon on
a charge of having assaulted his
mother, Mrs. Murrell, on June 24,
during the absence of male members
of the family from the house. He was
sentenced to a month in jail by Squire
W. H. Chittick. Murrell was remanded
last week for an examination by
Dr. James D. Wilson, jail physician, stated that he
is sane.

Murrell, victim of the assault,
stated that accused hit her daughter
with a rubber ball, and when she com-
plained to him he struck her in the
face, knocking her to the floor. He then
fled, and was later arrested on com-
plaint of the father. Murrell's sister,
aged 14 years, corroborated her moth-
er's testimony.

Wm. Murrell, father of the prisoner,
stated that it was not safe for the
women to allow his son at home. He
would not work, and possessed a very
wicked disposition ever since he was
sentenced to serve 30 days in court for
married for absconding himself from his
battalion without leave.

In sentencing the prisoner, Squire
Chittick said: "It is a good thing for
you that this offence was not com-
mitted by a man other than your
mother, although it is most degrading
that it is so. However, were it a
stranger you would be charged more
seriously and sent to prison for a long
term by a higher court. Any man who
strikes his mother should be lashed,
and if you do not behave in future you
will be punished more severely."

During the hearing of the case Mur-
rell was asked if he wished to give
evidence to which he replied: "No, I
want some tobacco." His request was
granted, and he persisted in smoking
in court during the progress of the
case prior to being sentenced he
broke down and wept bitterly.

WOMEN SUFFRAGE DEFEATED.
Brussels, July 2.—A bill granting suf-
frage to the women of Belgium was de-
feated by a vote of 59 to 74 in the
Chamber of Deputies here yesterday.

**MORE GERMAN GUNS
COMING TO LONDON**

**Two Field Guns and Howitzer
To Arrive Shortly.**

London is to have still more war tro-
phies in the form of German artillery.
Mayor Little received word today from
Ottawa that two more field guns and
a howitzer had been awarded to the
"town of London," and were on their
way here. Four guns were received last
week for the "city of London."

With these additional mementoes of
the great war there will be no difficulty
in giving all parts of the city a fair
share of the spoils. It is likely that
when the guns are received they will
be parked on the Federal Square prop-
erty, with the four which arrived last
week, until some other plans are made
for permanent locations for them in
other parts of the city.

HELD UP FOR \$500.
Toronto, July 2.—There were sev-
eral store burglaries and one highway
hold-up here today. Alexander Savin,
the victim of the hold-up, was badly
beaten and lost \$500. From the stores
the robbers secured small
amounts of money and goods.

**IF EAST END HALL
IS SOLD, WHERE WILL
FIRE HALL BE MOVED?**

**Public Library, Too, Will Have
To Be Provided For.**

Should a sale of the east end town
hall go through, of which there is now
a possibility, two important city de-
partments that are now located in the
building, would have to be provided
with other quarters. These are the No.
2 fire station and the east branch of
the public library. It has been pro-
posed several times that a new fire
hall should be built in the east end that
would give better accommodation for
the department, and that might also
be better situated for fire-fighting pur-
poses. It has even been suggested that
the station might go on the fair
grounds, though in view of the conges-
tion there now it is a question if an
other building not strictly devoted to
fair purposes would be welcomed.

The removal of the branch library to
other quarters would be a matter for
the public library board to deal with,
though it is likely that there would be
close co-operation with the city council
in this matter.

The present location
of the library is regarded as well suited
to the population that is to be served,
a very good indication of which is the
fact that East London people borrowed
50,000 volumes there last year. The
quarters, while well lighted, are made
too large, and if a small separate branch
library were built in the east end, with
roomy reading-rooms and plenty of
space for book shelves, allowing as well
for future growth, it would probably
mean further extensive growth in the
library's work in the east end.

Public Librarian Fred Landon stated
today that the matter of having to move
the east branch to other quarters had
been considered as a possibility by the
library board, but that in view of the
uncertainty of having to move, no defi-
nite action has yet been taken. The pos-
sibility of having a permanent home for
the branch was something that ought to
be turned to other use at any time.
Satisfactory in every way than occupy-
ing temporary quarters that were liable
to be turned to other use at any time.

Plenty of time will be afforded
library board to find new quarters
for the branch. Under present arrange-
ments, if the hall is sold it will be
the understanding that quarters for
a year for the hall and the
committee last week Mayor Little
asserted that neither of these two city
departments was far enough east to
deserving that efforts might be made
to establish them at some point a con-
siderable distance from the present
quarters.
