Reeve Armstrong Making Great Canvass—Liberal Meeting in Schomberg—Notes.

NORTH TORONTO.

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St. John Globe Says He Must Force Retraction—Minister's Hot Denial.

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Mayes has written to Dr. Pugsley explaining that it was a typographical error in the copy. The affidavit, however, has created greater consternation in this province than anything of a political nature in recent years. Dr. Pugsley's evening papers tonight denounce Mayes as a blackmailer and liar, but The Globe, the other Liberal paper, calls upon the minister to make Mayes prove or retract the statements made in the declaration. The Globe says it is up to the government to force a strict enquiry along the lines of the one Justice Cassels fitly pursuing in regard to the marine and fisheries expenditures.

George McAvity, seen to-day, declined to discuss the matter at all, referring reporters to Z. Barnhill, K.C., his solicitor. Barnhill would not talk, referring reporters to McAvity. To-night Pugsley and Marcell addressed a good sized meeting in the opera house, but the parade before hand was the tamest yet seen at a political demonstration where Pugsley was to speak.

The minister himself refers to Mayes as "an infernal, miserable scoundrel and a miserable liar." "In the first place," he said, "Mayes asked me what man in the province would be likely to go into the enterprise with him, and in this connection I mentioned Mr. McAvity as a possible investor. As to what the business arrangements were between Mr. Mayes and Mr. McAvity, I knew absolutely nothing until very lately, when an attempt was made to compel me to purchase the dredge under pain of dreadful disclosures, and I absolutely refused to be held up."

"The note which Mr. Mayes gave me was on account of professional services, for which he owed me a large sum in connection with several matters in which I had been his legal advisor, including the matter of getting the dredge in without duty, and also on account of the suit of Mayes v. Connell, and also Mayes' suit against the government in connection with the Long Wharf."

"The statement that I ever suggested any other consideration other than professional services, is a miserable lie. There was never any suggestion of a loan of any kind."

"For the last month Mr. Mayes had had people coming to me intimating what dreadful things he would expose if his claim for extra, which the engineers would not allow, were not settled, and it was persistent intimating to me that if I would only buy his dredge there would be no trouble. Mr. Mayes wanted \$150,000 for it, and the superintendent said it was worth \$101,000 at most."

"I received a telegram from J. B. M. Baxter, his solicitor, urging me to purchase the dredge, saying that it was most important that it should do so."

"On the last occasion when he interviewed me he proposed that I should purchase his dredge thru Mr. McAvity, and said he would add \$20,000 to the price, which would be used for election purposes, whereupon I immediately asked him to leave my office."

It seems, according to advertisements, that the reason Mayes was unable to secure the contract on the first call, and that tenders was because of the original estimate, which the dredge is registered in Canada. The second call omitted this.
