C. P. R. BRAKEMAN HURT AT ORANGEVILLE

Brought to City for Treatment—Chester and Midway Petitions Largely Signed.

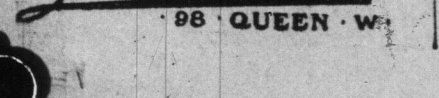
WEST TORONTO. C. P. R. Brakeman Badly Injured at Orangeville.

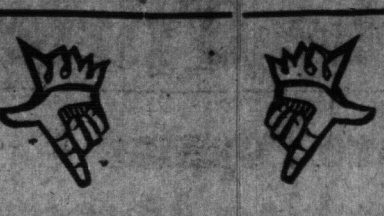
