In an interview with The World yesterday Hon. Adam Beck, speaking about the hydro-electric contract with Hamilton, said that the commission had received the draft agreement back from Solicitor Waddell, Hamilton. along with several suggested clauses. One of these clauses stipulated that Hamilton, which is only a customer for a block of power and not a participant like other municipalities, should share in any reduction of cost as a result of an increased demand for power. 
