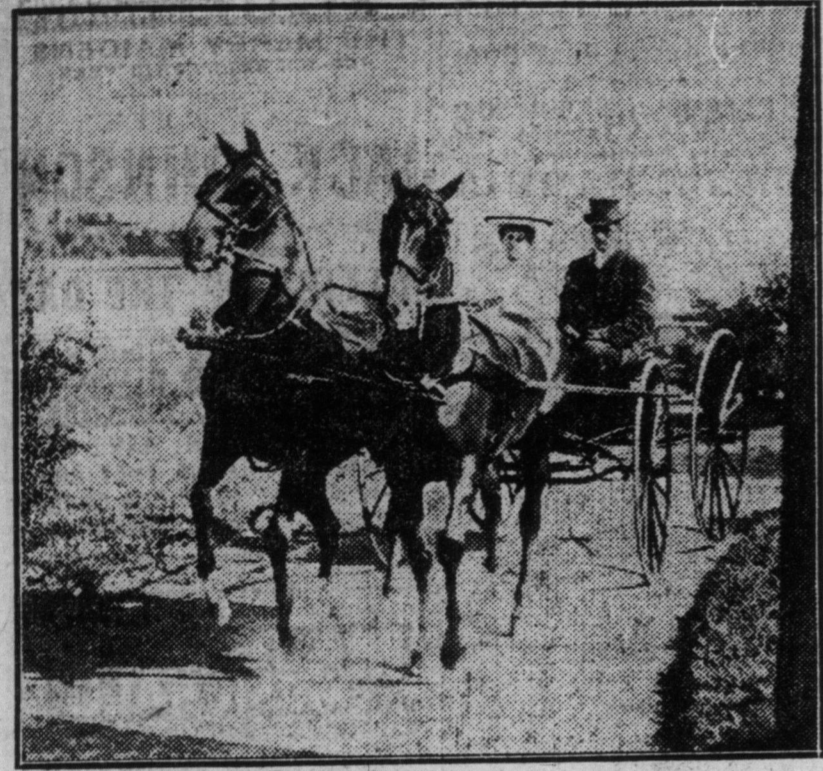

SUFFRAGETTE ARGUMENT ALTOGETHER TOO FLIMSY

Prof. Macphail of McGill Gives an Amusing Discourse on Popular Topic.

Dr. Macphail, editor of The University Magazine, and professor of the history of medicine in McGill College, revealed himself at the Empire Club yesterday as a Canadian Oliver Wendell Holmes or John Brown. His address on "The Psychology of the Suffragette" was a most delightfully whimsical fabric, quaint and conceited beyond measure, but with a basis of the soundest of common sense, and a garnishing of scientific and philo-sophic truth, the humor of which afforded his audience a rare intellectual treat.

To be properly appreciated his essay must be read in full, but the leading ideas will bear noting. In the first place he examined the arguments pro and con advanced by those taking part in the suffrage debate. He showed that all the ordinary arguments were mere repetition of those already too flimsy, too feminine, and too easily refuted for a reason which would be fundamental, and discovered one which had been valid since the first appearance of life on earth.

At first life had arisen in an amorphous mass in which there had been no distinction of male or female. The differentiation of sex was a convenient series of plant and animal life, was in order, for then it was impossible to say which sex prevailed. They were males, but physically were females. They would write letters to the papers and to each other, and to say whether the writers were male or female. Such persons as lacked what he would call the quality of manliness usually ceased a proper amount of manliness, and thus the balance was maintained.

In the outset there was one morphous mass and the male was merely a "sport" like all "sports," and as the amateur gardeners present were aware, the male had a great tendency to revert to the primitive type of the eternal feminine.

Female Type More Stable.

In the female affection of the voice, the conduct, the manly garb of the male, and the tendency to occupations like golf, cigarettes, etc., they saw the residue of the male which was not so stable, it was less sensitive, could endure more discomfort, was less intelligent, and was guiled less by the testimony of history that nations pass away thru effeminacy and men degenerate into what is significantly termed the "female type." Women have a sense instinct that this is not right, and perceive that the tendency of men to exaggerate the "female" qualities is perilous to the race. This is well illustrated by the secret pity entertained by women for a man about to mate himself with one of their sex.

Power of the Vote.

Women seemed to think that there was something thaumaturgic or at least sacramental about the vote, and that more and more it would confer on public life an inward grace, but voting was a mere ordinance, a way of expressing opinion, and the result depends on the vote. The option is good or bad. He feared that women might become the dupes of deceivers, or willing victims of honest reformers themselves. The contrivances that already exist for paralyzing the public will. Women must not expect that the polls will run backward to the ground and fall down as dead men.
