and 15 miles from Stanislau, also the small Town of Ottynia and six villages. On the left flank of their advance parties of Russian troops are clearing the enemy out of the way and they are approaching the River Vorone and the Town of Tysmienitsa, situated on its banks. In one day's action the Russians in this region overran 62 1-2 square miles of territory and captured prisoners and guns in abundance. A census of their captures has not yet been completed. Besides doing all these things the Russians also cut the railway between Buczacz and Stanislau, on which part of Von Bothmer's army depends for its supplies. \* \*

\* \* \* \* In the battle of the Somme yesterday the British advanced their line southwest of Guillemont for a distance of about 400 yards after they had pushed forward in places east of Trones Wood, and they are now in the outskirts of the village. Fighting is proceeding at Guillemont station. Northwest of Pozieres the Germans made four attempts with liquid fire on British trenches and all these attacks completely failed, Sir Douglas Haig reports. In one assault, however, the Teutons managed to occupy about 50 yards of a trench. A feeble bombing assault against the eastern part of the Leipzic salient was repuised by our men without difficulty. The enemy heavily shelled Longueval, High Wood and Pozieres and the vicinity of Mametz. Four British aeroplanes attacked a reconnaissance party of ten German aeroplanes that had crossed the British lines and scattered them in flight, and forced descents of two in the Teuton lines. \* \*

Fighting two battles and winning successes in both is the experience of the French army, for Gallic soldiers yesterday captured more trenches north of the Somme, and they beat off German attacks and captured trenches north of Verdun. In the Somme combat the French gains con sisted of the capture of a small wood and a strongly organized trench north of Hem, thus making in two days the capture of a whole line of German trenches on a front of 3.75 miles, having a depth of more than 300 to 500 yards. They also advanced east of Hill 139 and repulsed two attacks on their trenches west of the Monacu farm. Before Verdun they struggled strenuously and successfully all day with German troops on the Fleury-Thiaumont line and drove the Germans back from a trench they had captured and retook ground in the Thiaumont work. They also captured a whole first and part of the second line trenches of the enemy on the Vaux-le-Chapitre front. Two hundred unwounded prisoners were taken in the Verdun actions.

\* \* Important results were gained on the second day of the Italian \* offensive on the Isonzo front by the capture of the strongly-fortified and stubbornly-held bridgehead of Gorizia and of Monte Sabotino and Monte Sau Michele in sharp actions. Eight thousand prisoners were officially 19 years. Constable William Harwick recorded as taken, while later unofficial intelligence from Rome places the number at 10,000. The value of Gorizia to the Italians is that it removes a fortress from their rear in an advance along the Adriatic littoral wick of this city, were given provitowards Trieste. The loss of the bridgehead and the two heights is a severe one for the Austrians, for Italian possession of these vantage points enables them to dominate the fortress with their heavy guns, and it brings the fall of Gorizia within the practical certainties. Complete success in this operation would enable the Italians to set about the reduction of Austria's naval power in the Adriatic by the seizing of her sea






