Arrested in connection with the numerous thefts which have taken place recently at the yards of the Canadian Pacific Railway, Herbert Godfrey, appeared before Judge Coatsworth, in the sessions yesterday. He was charged with stealing pieces of carpet, boots, clothing and liquor from the company's premises.

Godfrey in his own defence, denied the accusation, and also denied that he had anything to do with the breaking of car seals.

### Brig.-General G. N. Cory Given Russian Order for Gallantry

The Russian decoration, the Order of St. Anne, has been conferred on Brigadier-General G. N. Cory, son of C. D. Cory, 5 Deer Park crescent. He has been mentioned three times in despatches for gallant service. In a letter home, he declares that the Serbian soldiers, now splendidly equipped, have been doing the biggest portion of the fighting about Monastir. Gen. Cory is on the Salonica front at present.

### THIRTY-FOUR ADDED TO ROLL OF HONOR

Five of the Number Reported  
to Have Given Lives to  
Cause.

### TWENTY WOUNDED

Two Citizens Are Stated to  
Have Been Lost on Tor-  
pedo Boat.

Thirty-four Toronto men are named in the latest casualty list. Two are reported lost on the torpedo boat Grise, one has died of wounds, two have died while prisoners of war, two are missing, three are ill, and one is a prisoner, and over 20 are wounded.

Lt.-Col. F. F. Clarke, who has been ill with pneumonia in hospital in England, has now recovered, according to word just received in Toronto by his wife. Col. Clarke states his battalion, 127th York County, when it goes to France, will be part of a large army used for construction purposes.

Lieut. Arthur H. McCormick, reported wounded, is an 81st Battalion officer, who spent last winter in Toronto at Exhibition Camp. His home is at Welland, Ont. He was a student at the outbreak of the war.

Lieut. Cyril McL. Fry, reported lost on the torpedo boat Grise, was a cousin of Mrs. J. A. Sutherland and the Misses Macdougall of 35 Trinity avenue. His home is in Detroit, but he had resided in Toronto for some time earlier in the war. He had also seen service with the navy in the North Sea.

Aubrey Melchin William Patch, reported killed in action, was a graduate of Toronto University, in 1908, with degree of B.A. Prior to enlisting he had been in the C.P.R. forestry department at Winnipeg.

First Petty Officer Walter E. Trimble, also reported lost in the Grise, was a Toronto man. He was formerly on H.M.C.S. Niobe. His wife and two boys live at 17 Gough avenue.

Pte. George Blackburn, reported as killed in action, for several years was with the Lawrence Bakery, Rev. W. L. Baynes-Reed, chaplain of the unit in which Pte. Blackburn enlisted. He sent a letter conveying the sympathy of his comrades, and states that the soldier fell during a brilliant charge.

Lance-Corp. James F. Walker, son of Mrs. Sarah H. Walker, 8 Pender street, and nephew of former Conservative member of Parliament, John James Simpson, has been killed in action in the fighting on the Somme front. Before enlisting he took an active interest in the Boy Scouts connected with Bathurst Street Methodist Church. He was a member of Ald. Fitzman's Bible Class.

Pte. J. A. Smith, reported missing on Oct. 8, is now unofficially reported to have died on Nov. 1, while a prisoner of war in Germany. He was 20 years of age, single, and enlisted last year with a Winnipeg battalion. His parents reside at 7 Edgewood crescent, Toronto.

Pte. W. D. Taylor, previously listed as missing, has died while a prisoner of war in Germany. He was 22 years of age, a native of London, England, but had been in Canada 11 years before enlisting in the 92nd Highlanders. He was employed as a messenger for the Quebec Bank. He formerly lived at 104 Moscovy avenue, and is survived by his widow and two children.

H. Lewis, formerly reported missing, is now believed to have been killed. A letter received by Miss Varren, 38 East Roxborough street, states that Pte. Lewis was instantly killed while attending wounded comrades. Before enlisting with the 75th Battalion he had been with the Canada Life Assurance Co., and lived at 20 Pembroke street.

### FREED OF CHARGE.

Lambrose Stoycheff, a Bulgarian, was discharged by Judge Coatsworth in the sessions yesterday. He was charged with stealing \$50 from Denets Dascaloff.
