POINT OF ORDER

MR. COSSITT—DELAY IN ANSWERING QUESTION NO. 45

Mr. Cossitt: Mr. Speaker, I wish to raise a very brief point of order with regard to question No. 45. This is a point of order I raised before. This question has not only been on the order paper since October 18 when this session began, but for a year before that. It asks how many public servants in the Public Service of Canada have been fingerprinted since January 1, 1972, an operation which the government, in answer to previous questions with regard to one department, the Unemployment Insurance Commission, has acknowledged is going on. I ask this question because it seems that those being fingerprinted are not just those in security positions such as in the Armed Forces and other security conscious positions, but people who are not in any way involved with security matters. Therefore it is a very serious question.

It is an invasion of the right of privacy of public servants of Canada that this is taking place. The government owes this House an accountability for having carried on and for still carrying on the business of fingerprinting public servants, many of whom have literally refused to go along with the procedure.

If the parliamentary secretary cannot supply the answer today as to when this can be answered, will he take it as notice and notify this House tomorrow when this question will be answered?

Mr. Andres: Mr. Speaker, I will certainly take notice of this question. All these questions are serious. We will have the answer for the hon. member.

Mr. Speaker: Shall the remaining questions be allowed to stand?
