GROUNDS WOULD BE BETTER THAN ISLAND BREAKWATER

H. C. Hocken Disputes Engineer's Recommendations—Need for New Crematoriums.

At the island committee yesterday it was reported that the storm of Tuesday had done some damage to the lake front, and even damaged parts of the breakwater. H. C. Hocken, representative of the Island Association, seized the occasion to urge the advisability of constructing groynes for the protection of the beach. In spite of the adverse opinion of the engineer, he was in making a policy that the breakwater would forever spoil it. He forcibly commended the plan of Edgar J. Jarvis, for preserving the beach, which he argued was the chief attraction at the island, and should be made larger instead of being shut off by a breakwater. Mr. Hocken stated that members supported him, but no action was taken.

CHEESE MAKER KILLED.

Body of Thomas Wood of Downs Found in a Ditch.

Stratford, Oct. 12.—Between 8 and 9 o'clock last evening, Thomas Wood, treasurer of the Maple Grove cheese factory, Downs, left Stratford for his home. At an early hour this morning he was found dead in about 18 inches of water in the ditch in Hugh Hannon's corner, about three miles and three-quarters from the city.

MURDERED A PRIEST.

Massacre of Greeks by Bulgarians Officially Reported.

Athens, Oct. 12.—The following semi-official statement has been issued: "Hardly a day passes without assassination of Greeks by Bulgarians, being reported from Macedonia. This Sunday in the village of Erythra, Monastir, an orthodox priest was murdered while he was celebrating mass, and his wife was burnt alive in her house. A Greek notable was also assassinated in the church. The object of these crimes is to terrorize Greeks into declaring themselves to be members of the Bulgarian 'committee,' thereby seeking to make the Bulgarian element predominant."

BARBARIOUS SUPERSTITION.

Heart and Hands of White Child in Possession of Negro Sorcerer.

Kingstown, St. Vincent, Oct. 12.—Barbarous superstition, which prevails among a portion of the population of West Indian Islands is the basis of a ghastly and extraordinary crime that has come to light in the island of St. Lucia. The finding of the heart and hands of a white child in the possession of a negro sorcerer, led to the discovery that the child had been murdered and the body mutilated in order that the superstitious natives might, through possession of portions of the body, be able to work spells.

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70 NEW MISSIONARIES

TO BE SENT TO THE WEST

Presbyterian Expenditure Will Be in Excess of Estimates, But Receipts May Increase.

After a busy session the home mission committee of the Presbyterian Church yesterday concluded their semi-annual meeting and delivered the report of the season's work. The reports presented by the various departments all bespeak a growth and increase in the work in the west and in the north-west and a consequent need of an increase in funds. In the past half year the expenses of the work have been \$66,000. If the expenditure for the winter season is in proportion the year's total outlay will be \$120,000, which is \$10,000 in excess of the estimate.

The committee are unwilling to get into a position where they have been compelled to decline to open up some of the new fields asked for by the synods. The lateness of payment of the contributions was regretted because the committee were unable to tell what the receipts of the year would be. They, however, expected to collect up a reasonable increase of from five to ten per cent. over the receipts of last year, and if so the excess will be made to get an increase in the contributions both from individuals and from churches.

To Increase Salaries. It was resolved last year by the general assembly that the salaries of the missionaries be increased. These have remained stationary for some time in view of the fact that the cost of living has increased. Another reason for an increase is the fact that missionaries going to the west are compelled to purchase their own railway tickets, conveyances and outfit. An effort will be made to increase the salaries in so far as the committee are able. Many applications have been received, and new fields and many have been granted. Grants have also been made from the central building fund for the erection of churches in Algeria.

Seventy New Missionaries. The arrangements have been so completed this year that there will be 70 new missionaries, mainly drawn from Scotland and Ireland, who will fill up the mission complement in the North-west as it has never been before, and a system of doubling fields, there will be very few fields without pastors. The increase in population in the west of ministers in the North-west has been phenomenal in the past few years, but it is the opinion of the committee that the next five years will break all previous records for rapidity of growth.

HOME FROM HUDSON BAY

George Boucher Visits His Parents at Peterboro.

Peterboro, Oct. 12.—George Boucher of York Factory, Hudson Bay, son of Dr. and Mrs. Boucher, is home for a month's visit. Mr. Boucher is an officer of the Hudson Bay Company, and is stationed at York Factory, which is 2000 miles from Peterboro, and 500 miles from the nearest railway station, which distance has to be traveled in much the same manner as in the back lakes country of Peterboro.

MOTORS FOR SARNIA TUNNEL.

Mr. Blair Thinks Railway Impressed With Idea.

Ottawa, Oct. 12.—At a meeting of the railway commission today Mr. Blair stated that he had given his attention to the necessity of adopting certain means of preventing railway accidents and had conferred with the railway authorities so far as no authorized announcement was made on the subject. He would not say how far the railway would go in the matter, but he was disposed to accept any reasonable and practical suggestions the commission might make. Mr. Blair has been referred to the recent terrible disaster in the Grand Trunk tunnel at St. Clair, and has been giving his attention to the use of electric motors for the haulage of trains thru this tunnel would prevent accidents. The railway is concerned would not doubt be impressed with the necessity of using electricity instead of steam.
