NEW WORLD'S MARK AT READVILLE

Uhan, 3-Year Old, Goes Mile in 2.13 3/4 at Matinee Races

It was a "short horse soon curried" at the Readville track yesterday afternoon. The three races that made up the farewell card for the Gentlemen's Driving Club's matinee all went off in straight heats. There was not much of a contest in any one of the three, but at that a new world's record was made when Charles Sanders' year-old colt Uhan trotted the second and final heat of his race in 2:13 3/4. It was one of the remarkable performances of the year, and when it is taken into consideration that Mr. Sanders is nearly 70 years of age and that the race was to wagon, it makes the mile one of the most notable accomplishments by a trotter of the age.

SHRUBB AND NEBRICH MATCHED

Great American Amateur Decides to Take a Chance With Fast English Runner.

TORONTO, Sept. 18—Word was received this morning to the effect that Alfred Shrubb, the great English runner, who has been staying in Toronto, had arranged a matched race with Frank Nebrich, the crack Buffalo amateur runner, who was suspended last week by the A. A. U. for racing Longboat and Coley without permit. Shrubb left Toronto last evening for New York, where he is to race on Thursday and Friday, and while in Buffalo last evening, he had a talk with Nebrich. Evidently Shrubb's persuasive powers are of the highest, for Nebrich consented to meet the Englishman at Hanlan's Island on Saturday next.

DUBLIN, Sept. 18—The members of the Royal Irish Yacht Club deplore the reported discussion in the New York Club as to whether American should race Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger with a freak or a real boat. It is said that the members of the New York Yacht Club favor a racing machine having their way there will be no race. NO MORE HONORS FOR EMERSON

He Has Had Enough of Life as a Cabinet Minister.

Will be Content to Represent Westmorland as a Private Member if People Want Him

Moncton, N. B., Sept. 19—Hall's Creek bridge, which has been out for two years to the great inconvenience of the people in Fox Creek and Dover direction and which has been the subject of much complaint, was formally opened this afternoon. The structure is 725 feet long, sixteen feet wide, is of steel with a draw and the cost is in the vicinity of \$200,000. There is quite a lot of work yet to be done on the approaches but the bridge may be used on the opening of the bridge was made the occasion for a celebration by the local government under the auspices of the county members. The people from Fox Creek and the Dover district, who are most interested in the bridge, showed their resentment in the delay of building the bridge by staying away. The gathering, which numbered about 500 or 600 people, was made up of porters from other sections of the county, including the new minister of public works, it was announced, would be in attendance. The four local members, Messrs. Sweeney, Copp and Legere, Robinson, Senator McCrewey and James Barnes, M. P., took part in the proceedings, but Dr. Pugsley was not present. After a brief inspection of the bridge short speeches were made from a platform erected for the occasion. The keynote of the speeches was an excuse for the delay in rebuilding this important bridge. Mayor White presided and the following order was read: Chief Commissioner LaBilloy, Premier Robinson, Mr. Emerson, Senator McCrewey, G. M. Legere, J. T. Hawke, A. B. Copp, F. J. Sweeney. The most interesting part of the proceedings was the statement made by Mr. Emerson to the effect that he would continue to represent Westmorland as long as the people of the county wanted him. "The idea seems to have got abroad that because I have resigned the position of minister of railways in the government I intended to retire from representation of the county of Westmorland. Let me say this: There's honor enough for any man White resided at the government. I intended to retire from representation of the county in the federal house without being enhanced by any portfolio, and so long as the people of the county want my services, just so long shall my services be at their command. "Let me say more. The very moment you do not want me say so and I will bow with the greatest good nature and will retire with all grace. "He expressed his gratitude to the people of Westmorland for the kindness shown him and said his gratitude would live as long as he was above the sod, and in return he would be thinking of the many kindnesses shown him. FATHER AND SON DROWNED TOGETHER

Jason Nickerson and His Ten Year Old Boy Drowned at Clark's Harbor Wednesday Night.

Clark Harbor, N. S., Sept. 19—One of the saddest accidents in the history of this place occurred after sundown last night, when Jason Nickerson and his ten-year-old son were drowned by the capsizing of a boat in this harbor, not far from their home. Nickerson, who was employed in building a wharf for the dogfish reduction works here, left for home with the other hands at 6 o'clock, but went back for supper to the wharf in his skiff to get some fish, and as the evening was fine, took his little boy with him for a row across the harbor. Not returning, some neighbors went to look for them a few hours later, and found the boat bottom up drifting ashore not far from the wharf, but found no sign of the missing ones. This morning a search began by a large number of people, and in a short time both bodies were discovered close to the landing, about five feet of water. It was an affecting sight when the bodies of father and son were brought to the surface, clasped so tightly in each other's arms that it took quite an effort to separate them. No other person was within a mile of the place when the accident happened.

DISOBEDIENT WITNESSES WILL BE ARRESTED NOW

Bench Warrants Issued to Bring Collins Case Witnesses to Court—New Evidence Adduced Yesterday to Show That Father McAulay Was Miles Away on Day of Murder.

Hopewell Cape, N. B., Sept. 19—There were two new features to the trial of Thos. F. Collins today. In the first place bench warrants were ordered to be issued for the arrest of William J. Dean and his son, William Dean, of Musquash, as they failed to attend as witnesses. The other feature was the introduction of testimony taken in the trial of the late Father McAulay, painter, of Albert, who told of painting Father McAulay's house during the year 1903 and the composition of the paint used. Douglas Spimney, who lives in Utopia, west of eight miles west of Musquash, next took the stand. He said that on August 23rd the prisoner came to his place and asked for something to eat. He said he was in the house of the late Father McAulay, and that he was going to St. Stephen.
