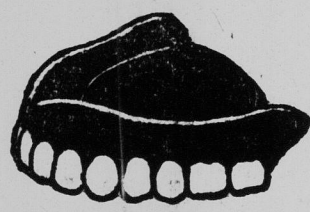

H. E. Macdonald, who comes to St. John from Nelson, B. C., as C. P. R. district freight agent was presented with an address and a solid silver service by a number of leading Nelson businessmen, with a dressing case by the members of his family in Nelson.

It is reported that the Miramichi lumber Co. will change both the Richards and argument mills into sawing mills and use all of their logs for pulp. They are getting out a big quantity this winter, while some of the other firms are cutting only half as much as last season—Chatham World.

NEW BRUNSWICK LEAGUE FOR 1908

To Increase Interest in Football—Could be Two St. John Teams—A Review of Season

Now that football for 1907 is practically at an end, a review of the season at this time would not be amiss. For the past two or three years the game has increased in quality and popularity here and bids fair soon to fill the place it once did when there was in existence a New Brunswick league and St. John won the championship after that memorable game at Moncton with Mount Allison. There is much more to be said for the game here than at that time, new material consequently is developing each year. If we will but look at the senior teams here today it will be at once seen that practically all the players are graduates from junior and intermediate ranks of from one to three years ago, and these form the fastest and best. The attendance at games has been steadily on the increase, showing that if the players will but exert themselves to play good football the public will support them. The season, however, has been all too short, and next year a start should be made much more towards the home of the game here. Such a league could be composed of two St. John teams, Marathons and Algonquias, two Fredericton teams, U. N. B. and Moncton. This is a matter that ought to be taken under consideration at an early date, so that if it was thought desirable, plans might be perfected so that no time would be lost beginning the season of 1908.
