NEW BRUNSWICK LEAGUE  
SCHEDULE SUBMITTED

There has been considerable speculation since the meeting of the New Brunswick League delegates, on Thursday night last, as to how the league schedule would be framed up.

The schedule question was the principal one considered at the meeting and as the discussion lasted until 5:15 on Friday morning, it will be seen that considerable time was spent in throwing it out. The first decision reached was that the games on May 24 should be between the Portland and St. John teams in the morning, while the Turtles and the winner of the morning game should play in the afternoon. Afterward, as it became apparent that the schedule could not be finished at the meeting, a committee, composed of J. D. Black representing the Turtles, Cornelius Rogan of the Portland and Joe Page of the St. John team, was appointed to consider the whole question and decide upon a schedule to be submitted to the secretary by May 12. The motion appointing the committee passed without a dissenting voice.

Mr. Rogan, representing the Portland team, called upon the league secretary this morning and presented the schedule which has been agreed upon by the local representatives upon the schedule committee. It is as follows, all games being played on the grounds of the last named club:

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Note—Fredericton to have 50 per cent of gross gate receipts of both July 1 games, or the choice of either local team to go to Fredericton on that day for two games. Choice to be made by June 1.

According to the above schedule one of the St. John teams will play in Fredericton every Wednesday, except holidays, during the season, while the games on the local grounds will be played on Friday and Saturday, it being agreed that the local games shall be alternately played on the Victoria grounds and Shamrock grounds.

No schedule has as yet been submitted from Fredericton, but Mr. Black will probably be heard from before May 12.

**Intercollegiate Meet**  
Concerning the proposed intercollegiate meet, Allen A. McIntyre of Acadia College writes to the Telegram as follows: "Present indications almost annihilate the possibility of having an intercollegiate track meet either in St. John or Halifax this year. As for us in Acadia, we are willing to compete in this meet either on June 3 or June 10. However, though the students are willing and indeed most anxious to compete on either of the above dates, the anniversary exercises of Acadia will begin on June 3, and the faculty have found it necessary, and rightly so, not to permit our team to be absent from those exercises, as several of the graduating class will be members of the track team. Therefore it is absolutely impossible for us to meet on June 3, thus making June 10 the only possible date for us."

"The other colleges will close a week earlier and, of course, June 3 is much more preferable for them. If these two colleges—St. John, N. B., and Mt. Allison—could compete on June 10, and I am quite sure they could, only in so doing they would of necessity be required to sacrifice one week of their summer's engagements."

"Perhaps it would be asking too much of them to do this, but it seems to me that rather than see the intercollegiate track meet fall through this year they should be willing to make this sacrifice."

Hackenschmidt, the "Russian Lion," is one of the greatest wrestlers that ever lived—perhaps the greatest. He is only 5 feet 8 inches tall, but he weighs 200 pounds. He is more muscular than Sandow and much stronger. In spite of his huge and knotted anatomy, Hackenschmidt is a clever tumbler and all-round gymnast. He is quick, like Frank Gotch.

During the past three years the Russian Lion has made a fortune on the mat.
