How Two Smooth Gentleman Made Money Out of a "Cure All on the English Market—Did Not Venture It On This Side.

Glasgow Weekly Herald, Sept. 6. The object of the action was to have the respondent interdicted from selling under the name of "Bile Beans" any pills or other articles not made or supplied by the complainants. It was not a proceeding for the protection of a registered trade mark, but for the protection of the complainants' trade and of a trade name at common law.
