Sitting—Lt. Col. Hughes (Brigade Major), Brig-General Turner, V.C., D.S.O. (Brigadier), Capt. E. W. Pope (Staff Capt.).

UNUSUAL WILL OF NOVA SCOTIA MAN

Bequests to Son and Daughter
Dependant Upon Marriage and
Number of Children

The will of George N. Crosby, of Bear River, N. S., is of unusual interest. He leaves to his daughter, Doris, \$2,000 on the occasion of her marriage, and an additional \$1,000 on the birth of each child. He also provides \$50 a month for his daughter during the time that she remains single. By the time she reaches the age of thirty-six, if his daughter is still unmarried, and his son, Theophilus Crosby, is married, the estate is to be divided between them. If his son is then unmarried the entire estate is to go to the daughter.

The annuity to his daughter is dependent upon her yielding up to his trustees the sum of \$4,000 life insurance payable to her on his death, upon her living separate and apart from her mother, obeying the commands of her guardians and not living for more than three weeks of any year in the United

States. Failing this the bequests to her are void.
The bequests to his daughter also become void if she marries the son of a Digby county man, whom he names in the will.

If the bequests to the daughter fail for any of these reasons other bequests are to be made as follows: \$300 to keep his cemetery lot in good condition; \$300 to be used to pay the Yarmouth band for giving two concerts each summer at which certain favorite airs of the testator, specified in the will, shall be played; \$100 each to his mother, his brothers and sisters, Scotia Lodge and Albert Wyman of Bear River; \$200 to disburse the minds of the public of the evil reports circulated regarding him, and \$1,000 to Pauline Chute, daughter of Yvonne F. Chute.

To his son, Theophilus, he gives \$1,200 on his marriage and \$600 on the birth of each child he may have reaching the age of three months.

The balance of the estate is to be disposed of as indicated by the foregoing provisions.




