In the event of the Government not being disposed to cancel the clause respecting the continuation of medical attendance, it is understood that the employers will ask that a provision be made for contribution by the workmen of a proportion of the cost of operation of the act.

It is said that the employers are unanimously in favor of the principle of the act but they claim that some of the provisions work a hardship on some of the industries. For instance, it is claimed by the lumber interests that the matter of medical aid in the sparsely settled country districts is extremely expensive and under the same conditions it is difficult to keep in touch with the men who have been injured until they return to work. They say that the lumber industry is one of the largest interests in the province, but that the Compensation Att bears proportionately heavier on them than on any of the other industries.
