Sir Thomas White Tells Canadian Society Disarmament Alone is Not Enough.

Sir Thomas said he was not such an timist as to believe that the world has in its last war, although this generan "is not likely to see another World

"If the majority opinion among civilized people could be kept fully informed and had to be consulted before war could come about, there would be few wars," he continued. "In the past those who were called upon to bear the sacrifices have had little to say before the

who were called upon to bear the secrifices have had little to say before the event.

"If the Constitution of the Central Empires had provided that in each case of war each of the Emperors and their sons should take their place in the foremost line of battle, there would have been no war. The only way to avoid war is to keep public opinion accurately informed upon international affairs and enable the people to correctly judge the purposes of nations."

The United States was to be congratulated on calling the Washington Conference, he said, for the mere bringing of the nations together upon such a theme was an epochal event in the history of humanity. He points out that the reduction of armanment would lift great burdens from the backs of the people. War could only be avoided, he added, if the people of the world could be induced to adopt toward each other a different standard of conduct than has prevailed in the past.

"Canada believes in conferences which may result in better international understandings," said the speaker. "For over 100 years there has been peace between America and Britain. Having similar ideals, laws and traditions and a common language and literature there has been no great difficulty in mutal understanding of problems and purposes.'

John Hamilton Fulton, Senior Vice President of the National City Bank, who presided, hailed the Washington conference as an epoch-making one. He said the Canadian Society played a part in the amity existing between the United States and Canada similar to that of the Pilgrims Society in London.
