RAILWAY THEFTS
NOT SURPRISING
Russian Employees' Monthly Pay Less Than Price of Loaf.

Moscow, Jan. 7.—(By mail).—Thefts of goods from Russian railways are so extensive that M. Dierjinsky, the Pole who now directs the railway administration, asserts that it will be necessary to establish a special police force to stamp it out. Dierjinsky first came into international notice through his direction of the counter-revolutionary organization known as the Cheka during the Red terror period in the summer of 1918.

He recently denounced the railway employees as speculators and traffickers who should be jailed. However, it is difficult to understand how the railroad men can be expected to work without stealing, for trainmen have told the correspondent that their pay amounted to only 5,000 Soviet rubles a month. This is equivalent to twenty American cents, less than the price of a single pound of black bread.

The American Relief Administration is protected against theft by special guards, and the Bolshevik government makes good all losses of American foodstuffs. But even the knowledge that detection will probably mean death has not prevented thieves from stealing American supplies.

The railway administration asked for 618,000,000 gold rubles for maintenance of transportation in 1922; but the government allowed only 48,000,000 in the budget. However, it included a provision that every department of the government shall pay for hauling its freight.

Soviet Russia now has 900,000 railway employees and the Ukrainian republic 888,000. Great reductions in their numbers have been made because of the inability of the food commissars to provide food for more. In fact they are unable to supply all the food promised to the reduced personnel.

There is a great cry in Russia that the railways be put on a paying basis.

FALSE BOTTOM IN
AUTOMOBILE HELD GOOD
SUPPLY OF LIQUOR

Windsor, Ont., Feb. 4.—Customs Officer J. Kelly, of Windsor, is suspicious of new automobiles, and twice within a week he has "spotted" liquor in new cars at the Windsor ferry dock. The latest victim is Clifford Strasser, Detroit. Stopping Strasser's car at the dock tonight, Kelly found six cases of liquor hidden beneath a false bottom of the car. There were two cases of "Wild Tom" gin, two cases of creme de menthe, and an assortment of imported whiskies and brandies, all bearing the label of the Quebec Liquor Commission.

POLAND TO ELECT
FIRST PRESIDENT

Pilsudski, Witos and Trampczynski in Field—Paderevski Undecided.

Warsaw, January 11.—(By Mail).—Poland, politically, is eagerly looking forward to the summer elections, when the first president of the new republic will be chosen by a national assembly composed of representatives of both chambers of the Diet.

Joseph Pilsudski, who was appointed chief of state just after Poland was declared a republic late in 1918, and has held office ever since under a provisional constitution, is understood among politicians to be one of the presidential candidates. Several other names have been mentioned, but the newspaper editorial writers appear reasonably confident that the chief contenders will be Pilsudski, Vincent Witos, former premier, and the present leader of the Peasant party in the Diet, and Wojciech Trampczynski, speaker of the Diet.

There has also been much speculation among politicians as to whether Ignace Jan Paderevski, pianist and formerly premier, would enter the presidential race, but no definite announcement has ever been made one way or the other. For nearly a year Paderevski has been in America, spending most of his time in Paso Robles, California.

Ignace Paderevski was recently quoted as saying at Paso Robles that he probably would return to Poland within four or five months, that he considered himself at the service of his country and always ready for a call, but he did not think he would accept the presidency if it were offered to him. He added that he had no intention to take part in government affairs.

KING'S DAUGHTERS MET.
