## READ OUT OF COMMUNISTS

Two Swiss Judges Who Sentenced Socialist Workman Are Ousted.

Geneva, Feb. 25.—(Associated Press, By Mail).—Two Swiss judges of the cantonal tribunal at Zurich have just been read out of the Swiss Communist Party for having sentenced a socialist workman to 10 days in jail for assaulting an unindicted worker in a strike at Zurich.

The judges, Dr. Buisseret and Luchinger, were summoned to appear before the socialist communist committee on a charge that the verdict was "incompatible with the communist doctrine." When the judges refused to appear, they were promptly ousted from the party.

Writing in the Volksrecht Journal, the judges declare that though they are socialists and demand liberty they judge according to their conscience and law without regard to outside political pressure.

Many papers commenting on the incident state that this should be an example to Swiss voters of what the result would be if communists who received their orders from Moscow were to come into power in Switzerland.

The agrarian parties of several cantons have made a proposal that all communist employees should be dismissed as a danger to the state.

**STILL SEARCHING FOR 'FLU GERM'**

London, Feb. 25.—(Associated Press by Mail).—In the report issued by the ministry of health on the epidemic of influenza of 1918-1919 it is stated that the cause of the disease is a problem "still unsolved." The report is the result of what is described as the "most intensive study of the great and devastating scourge that swept Europe and Asia, and during the space of a few months, claimed a larger number of victims than fell during the whole of the European war."

It is stated that the immediate outlook is not such as to inspire confidence. "Until a universal improvement in the standard of comfort and the conditions of life is secured there will be no prospect of activity mitigating the incidence of the deadly disease. Other diseases have been brought under control, influenza still eludes us," the health ministry admits.

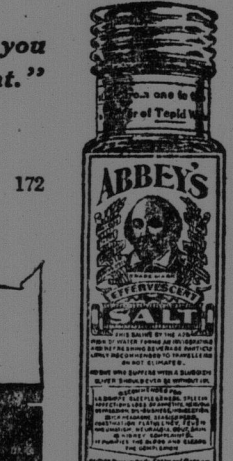
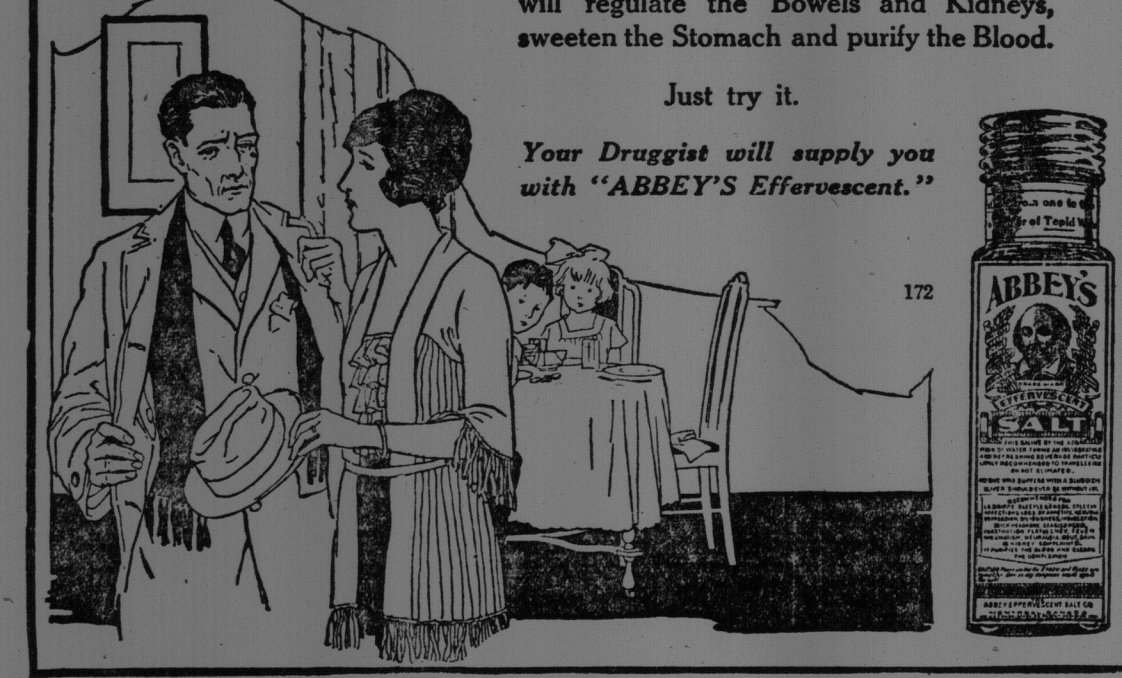

## ADDITIONS TO SCHOOL SYSTEM ARE ADVOCATED

Two delegations appeared before the board of school trustees at its meeting last evening. A committee from the St. John Local Council of Women asked the board to endorse the bringing of the free kindergarten under the school system and Dr. William Warwick and Dr. Mabel Hanington, of the sub-district board of health, presented a statement of the number of cases of mentally retarded in the public schools and asked that the board arrange for special classes for these children. Some successful financial transactions were reported. The two delegations were given sympathetic hearing and a committee was appointed to bring in a report on the free kindergarten as a special meeting.

The committee appointed by the Local Council of Women was first admitted to the meeting. The members were Mrs. F. E. Holman, convenor; Mrs. W. F. Hatheway, Mrs. W. Edmond Raymond, Mrs. H. H. Pickett, Mrs. E. Atherton Smith, Miss Gunn, Miss K. Greeney, Mrs. E. A. Young and Mrs. Bohan.

Mr. Coll spoke of the death of John Roberts who was carpenter to the board for more than thirty years and had been the carpenter of the Portland board previously. On Mr. Coll's motion a suitable expression of regret was to be sent to the relatives and salary for three months to be given to the widow.

**MORE EVIDENCE IN  
BERRY CASE**

## LOOKING FOR CANDIDATE FOR POSITION OF DUTCH MINISTER TO U. S.

The Hague, Feb. 25.—Selection of a new Dutch minister at Washington to succeed J. T. Cramer, resigned, has presented difficulties to the Dutch foreign office because of the high cost of living at the American capital. While the incumbent at Washington is generally presumed to need a personal fortune.

Much interest has been aroused in diplomatic circles of The Hague by the decision of the American minister, William Phillips, to take up his residence, for several weeks each year, in Amsterdam, which is nominally the capital, though The Hague is the residence of the queen and the seat of the parliament. Mr. Phillips is doing this in order to meet the financial and commercial leaders of Holland. His first period of residence there has been scheduled for late in February or early in March.

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## MONEY TERMS IN TREATY OF POLES AND THE SOVIET

London, March 15.—Poland's share in the gold of the Russian State Bank has been fixed at 30,000,000 rubles by the treaty between the Soviet representatives and Poland, which is virtually complete, says a despatch to the London Times from Riga.

Another 30,000,000 gold rubles are to be paid by the Russians in return for the surrender, by the Poles, of their share of rolling stock of the Russian railways, but the method of payment had not been decided on.

The Bolsheviks, the despatch declares, have not agreed to the Polish view as to the question of the date of the ratification of the treaty, which remains in suspense.

The reparations constitute a matter of paramount importance for the Poles, including the return of various supplies, which are to be claimed, namely, Polish capital invested in Russia and funds of Polish institutions in Petrograd and elsewhere. The Polish shares in the Russian state pension office have been settled. The payments will be made in Polish marks at a rate of exchange of 100 marks to the Poles. The pension payments will be made as soon as the plan of distribution is worked out.

Other claims are to be dealt with by a mixed commission which, it is estimated, has two years work ahead of it.

## MUSIC LESSONS NOT AN EXCUSE

Kent County, Ontario, People  
Fined for Keeping Children  
From School.

Chatham, Ont., March 15.—Magistrate Arnold has decided that a parent who does not keep a child out of school for the purpose of taking music lessons. Henry Truitt, Richard Adams, Alfred Reid and Mrs. Harriet Hope, appeared in the police court, charged with this offense under the provisions of the new school attendance act passed by the Ontario Legislature. The magistrate held that while there were certain things for which a child could be kept at home such as illness in the family, music lessons were not one of them, and he therefore imposed a fine of five dollars and costs, \$16.00 in all upon each of the offenders, who are all residents of Howard Township with children attending the Township School. It is likely the case will be appealed.

## IN PARLIAMENT

Ottawa, March 15.—(Canadian Press).—Yesterday in the commons was private members' day.

Mr. Foran moved that the government should bring forward a policy having for its object the development of the natural resources of Canada, occupied almost the entire afternoon and evening. The motion was declared lost without a vote.

A motion by H. A. MacKie, Edmonton East, that the new oil regulations for the Northwest Territory are detrimental to development of the oil industry was withdrawn. The house rose.

Today will be taken up the estimates on the departments of justice and of agriculture and a resolution on the oleomargarine act.

## SYNTHETIC ALCOHOL ON COMMERCIAL SCALE

London, March 15.—G. O. Colvert, a research worker of Tuckingsham, claims to have achieved the manufacture of synthetic alcohol on a commercial scale. The process employing carbon and raw material and enabling it to be sold at 20 sterling a ton.

## MAY PAY HER DEBTS BY PRINTING MONEY

Paris, March 15.—If a law fathered by M. Aubriot, chairman of the financial commission of the Chamber of Deputies, is passed, France will pay her interest on her debts by the simple expedient of getting her printing presses to work and issuing the necessary cash.

The amount Aubriot proposes to print is 150 billion francs. It would be secured, according to Aubriot, by France's possession of the ultimate German indemnity, which is estimated at about that sum.

## ST. VINCENT'S ALUMNAE

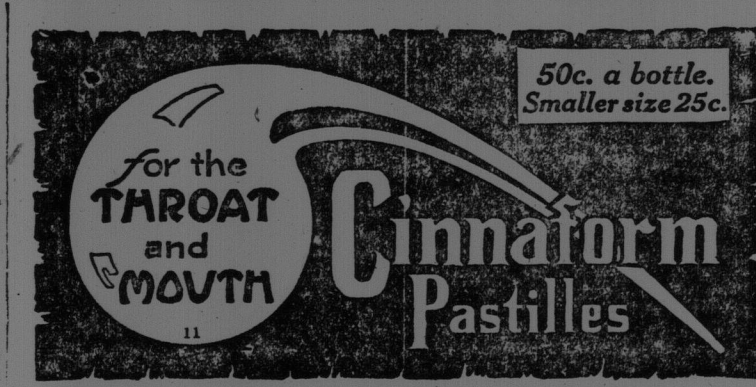
