MENU FOR THURSDAY.

Breakfast: Buckwheat Pancakes, Coffee, Dishes, Apple Sauce.

Lunch: Boiled Pigs' Feet, Potatoes, Sauerkraut, Raisin Pie, Supper.

Dinner: Brown Bread, Fish Pie, Plum Preserve, Tea.

The recipe for Fish Pie, mentioned above, is as follows:

Fish Pie—1½ cups of flaked cod fish, 1½ cups of creamed potatoes (made as usual), 1½ cups of buttered crumbs (Wheat and meat saving recipe by a Domestic Science Expert on the staff of the Food Controller's Office).

STARVATION GRIPS ROUMANIAN PEOPLE

Have Sufficient Maize to Feed Population Till May, But Diet Insufficient

Petrograd, Jan. 30.—British officers who have made a thorough investigation of conditions in Roumania, returned to Petrograd and gave an account of the food situation there. They said the Roumanian peasant women have been almost starving for months or existing solely on maize. The effect is shown particularly among newly-born children, many of whom are deformed.

The effect of starvation on future generations is causing much concern to the officials than the present state of affairs. The Roumanians have sufficient maize to feed the peasant population until May, but this diet by itself will not give proper sustenance.

Notwithstanding this and other privations, the Roumanian army is maintaining discipline. Information from authoritative sources emphatically contradicts rumors of any pronounced movement against King Ferdinand. It is declared that only the smallest minority seeks to overthrow the government.

Aid Russians to Denoche.

Roumanian troops are aiding the Russian commander in the gradual demobilization of the Russian army on the Roumanian front. The Roumanians are on guard against marauding bands of soldiers insisting that all give up their arms before being released from their units.

A battle occurred four miles from Jassy between Ukrainian and Bolshevik forces. It lasted for eight days.

An attempt to assassinate Lieut.-Gen. Stecherbacheff, commander of the Russian forces in Roumania, was defeated on Dec. 20.

Several persons were killed recently in a battle at Kiev, brought on by an attempt on the part of soldiers to compel officers to give up their capulettes.

ETHEL HARRIMAN TO WED LIEUT. RUSSELL

War Nurse, the Daughter of Mrs. J. Borden Harriman, Betrothed to New Yorker

Paris, Jan. 30.—The engagement of Miss Ethel M. B. Harriman, daughter of Mrs. J. Borden Harriman of New York, to Lieut. Henry Potter Russell, son of Charles H. Russell of New York, is announced. The marriage will take place in Paris.

Miss Harriman sailed from New York last June for France at the same time as Mrs. Vincent Astor, to serve as a war nurse, having completed an intensive course in training a few days before sailing. She was a debutante of last season, and was among the few girls of that year to be presented at Newport, New York and at Washington, D. C., where her mother resides.

Several entertainments were given for her during her debutante year. At the annual entertainment given by the Junior League last January, called "Around the Clock," she made the hit of the extravaganza in the role of Madame Benham, a fashionable modiste. The summer of her Newport presentation she gave a thrill to society by making an airplane flight over Narragansett Bay.

In the winter of 1914, soon after the death of her father, Miss Harriman accompanied her mother to Colorado on a visit to the estate of her father's former president of the Colony Club, from which she resigned, and of which her father was a member. She was chosen by President Wilson a little more than four years ago as a member of the Industrial Commission, which investigates and reports on the relations between capital and labor, and has made her home in Washington since that time. During the last national campaign she was chairman of the organization committee of the Women's National Union and Marshall organization of New York.

Mr. Russell, now in France, is a son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Howard Russell of 109 East Seventy-third street, New York, and is a graduate of Harvard class of '15. He belongs to the Knickerbocker Club. His brother, Chas. H. Russell, Jr., is attached to the American legation at The Hague. Miss Geraldine Russell is his sister. His father is a prominent lawyer, and has taken an interest in many movements that had to do with the preservation of the fine arts.

TORONTO HAS A JAIL FARM FOR WOMEN

(Toronto Star.)

The opening of the new building on the women's jail farm, which will take place next week, will be one more big step in the work that is being done toward the reclaiming of erring women.

The building is modern to the minutest detail and is the work of the architect and Controller O'Neill may be justly proud of the culmination of their plans.

At the south side of the building, a red-proof in construction and will accommodate about sixty people. The interior is finished in grained maple with the dark oak finish, the massive doors of the same wood are designed without panels, and are dust proof. The cement floors are covered with battisette linoleum to deaden the tread, and save sensitive nerves from unnecessary jarring.

It is a two-story brick building, a large assembly hall. A big open fireplace hints to cozy winter evenings while opening of the side a balcony overlooking the grove, in the summer months, will be an inviting shelter. Another big balcony opens off the sewing rooms on the opposite side of the building.

There are two large sewing and knitting rooms, for summer or winter the women are never idle.

All their own clothing and that worn by the men at the neighboring farm is made by their busy fingers, while one hundred pairs of socks and stockings per week are turned out by their two knitting machines. Many of the girls are especially interested in this part of the work, and intend to continue in the trade after they leave the farm.
