The projected building for the institute was considered and Rev. R. B. Hooper and Rev. R. A. Armstrong were left to deal with the matter. Rev. Mr. Hooper, the retiring president, has held that office for five years and his valuable services were highly recognized in a vote of thanks tendered him. The report of the year's business was satisfactory and showed encouragement. A donation of \$50 from Mrs. John Berryman was acknowledged. The matter of the appointment of a city missionary was said to be growing into a necessity.

HALF AND HALF NEW RULE FOR CITY PAVING WORK

Permanent pavement work which will be undertaken by the city in the future will be paid for by the city and by the property owners in the street, in equal shares. This decision was reached at a meeting of the city commissioners yesterday afternoon and its object is to provide that the half of the cost will be borne by the people whose property will be benefited by the improvements and at the same time make the cost to the city lighter and allow a more comprehensive programme of improvements. Notice will be given of any intended pavements and the work may be held up by a petition of the owners of one-third of the frontage.

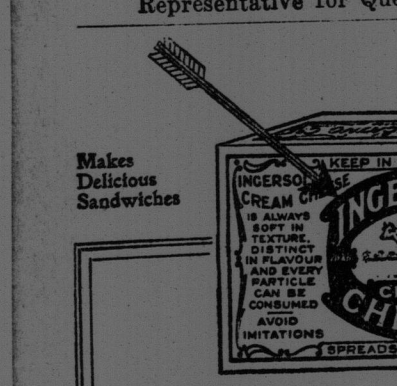

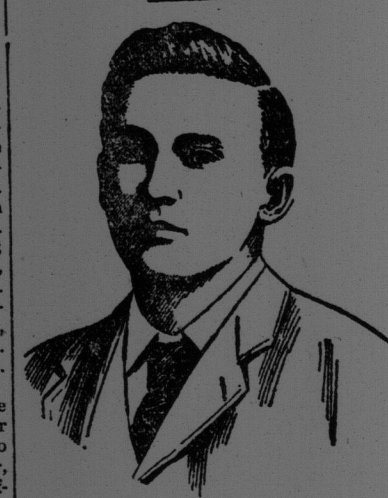

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BORDEN RESOLUTION HAS 32 MAJORITY

Interesting Time in Parliament at Ottawa—Second Reading on Tuesday

Ottawa, Feb. 13.—The combined forces of the Nationalists and Conservatives yesterday voted down the Liberal amendment to an effective Canadian fleet, the vote being 122 to 75, a coalition majority of 47. The amendment made by Mr. Verreille, labor representative in the house, for an appeal to the people before committing Canada to the naval construction, was also defeated on the same majority. The ranks of the Nationalists and Conservatives were increased by one, Col. McLean, of Queens-Sunbury. After the vote had been taken, Mr. Mondou, on behalf of the Nationalists, in an endeavor to "square" themselves, moved a resolution to the effect that the house declines to concur in the vote of money for defense, as it would mean a sharing in the external responsibility of the empire outside of Canada, and Canadian territory was the only portion of the empire over which the people of the dominion had sway. This resolution was ruled out by Speaker Sprague as was also another Nationalist resolution moved by Mr. Gubbins proposing the amendment to the Laurier naval service act and the submission of the government's proposal to the people on a plebiscite.

The final vote on the Borden resolution was 115 to 83, a government majority of 32. One Liberal, Col. McLean, voted against the government and Messrs. Achin, Boulay, Mondou, Lamarche, Guilbault, Barrette and Bellemare, Nationalists, voted against the proposal. Premier Borden declared that the measure would be immediately introduced when the house met this afternoon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier directed attention to the fact that it was 1 o'clock in the afternoon and did not think it fair that the measure should be presented on this afternoon. He suggested that it be introduced with Tuesday, a suggestion Mr. Borden finally accepted. The house adjourned with scenes of unusual character. The members on both sides stood several moments alternately cheering their respective leaders, while the Liberal members remained for some time watching. O Canada, Rule Britannia were sung in the hall before the members passed out to don caps and coats.

Thus ends the first trial of strength. It is needless to say the Liberals will continue their opposition with undiminished determination. The concluding speeches of the debate by Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Premier Borden tonight dealt briefly with the Verville amendment. The latter chief effectively pointed out the inconsistency of the premier and his Nationalist allies in declaring before the house the necessity of consulting the people prior to giving effect to any naval policy should be adopted while now they were refusing such demand.

SPEECHES IN THE LOCAL HOUSE ARE BRIEF

Proceedings of the Opening Session of the New Brunswick Legislature

Fredericton, Feb. 13.—The first session of the provincial legislature elected last fall, was opened today with the usual pomp and ceremony. During the solemnness of the occasion the proceedings were briefer and tamer than in other years.

The house met at three o'clock and elected Hon. George J. Clarke as speaker and W. H. Dickson as deputy speaker. Following the election of the speaker, His Honor the Lieutenant Governor announced and entered the hall and read the speech from the throne.

The reply was moved by L. P. D. Tilley of St. John, who dwelt on some of the features of the speech, dealing with agriculture, education and transportation, and referring to the prospects of the province in an optimistic and eloquent fashion. Mr. Hickey of Gloucester was heard in a brief speech seconding the reply.

Mr. Dugal, who, with his colleague from Madawaska, Mr. Pelletier, constitutes the opposition, spoke briefly, congratulating the mover and seconder on their addresses and announcing that he would reserve further comment until a later date. Premier Fleming followed, congratulating the mover and seconder on their addresses, and then proceeding to the discussion of the matters referred to in the speech from the throne. With reference to the claim for increased compensation from the dominion government the premier said that the rights of the maritime provinces had been sacrificed by the grants of large areas to Manitoba, Alberta and Saskatchewan, and also by the extension of the boundaries of Ontario and Quebec. The compensation demanded is \$6,000,000, or, at five per cent, an annual revenue of \$345,000.

The premier spoke of the possibility of doubling the agricultural production of the province, which now amounts to about \$20,000,000 annually, and outlined the policy of encouragement for agriculture. He announced the intention of the government continuing their protest against any decrease in the tariffing of representation in the federal parliament and of pressing the claims for the fishery award.

Rev. Dr. Smith was appointed chaplain and Douglas Black official reporter for the house. Hon. Mr. Fleming introduced a bill to provide a sinking fund for the redemption of the public debt. In explanation, he said that the bill provided that in future the proceeds of sale of crown lands or utilities should be deposited in a special fund which would be known as the crown land sinking fund. In the past he said that the proceeds from the sources named had been turned into the current revenue and the province had been dissipating its capital without liquidating its assets to
