MARITIME PROVINCES' PLEA

FOR FIXED REPRESENTATION
TURNED DOWN IN CONFERENCEWill Ask For Increase in Subsidies and
To Pay Lieutenant Governors More

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 28.—The provincial conference has turned down the application of the three maritime provinces to have their federal representation fixed so that it cannot fall below the present figures.

It was decided to ask an increase in

provincial subsidies equal to forty cents

a head of population to be applied to

ward the administration of justice. It

was also resolved to ask that the salaries

of lieutenant governors be increased.

They now get \$10,000 a year. The

amount of increase was not specified.

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
