Popular Sussex Physician Says Yes to Request—Rousing Liberal Rally in St. Martins

Sussex, N. B., May 10.—A strong delegation of Liberals from Sussex and vicinity, accompanied by A. B. Copp, M. P., leader of the opposition, waited on Dr. G. N. Pearson tonight and requested him to allow his name to be presented as a candidate for the local legislature to the Liberal convention at Hampton next Thursday.

Dr. Pearson replied favorably, and there was great satisfaction expressed by the delegation. Dr. Pearson is very popular throughout the county and there is little doubt he will be nominated and elected.

St. Martins, May 10.—One of the most enthusiastic political meetings held in these parts in a long while took place last night in the Masonic Hall, when the Liberals of St. Martins and vicinity met to select delegates and candidates to the Liberal convention, which is to be held at St. Martins on the 14th inst.

The meeting found the party in excellent condition and in fine fighting attitude and things never looked better for the election of a full Liberal ticket. Robert W. Skillen occupied the chair and W. E. Skillen acted as secretary. Rousing speeches were delivered by James Lowell, ex-M.P., P. A. F. Beattie, M. P., and W. E. Foster, and all predicted that the party would reform itself in the elections soon to be held.

That the large audience was in full sympathy with the speakers was evidenced by the rounds of applause that greeted the many points made against the Flemming government.

The White Star liner Adriatic arrived at Southampton yesterday afternoon having on board J. Bruce Ismay, managing director of the line, who was one of the survivors of the Titanic disaster.

Ottawa, May 10.—The new four-dollar bill is to be withdrawn gradually from circulation, and the government will issue a five-dollar bill, the first of that denomination, the "Silver-dollar" is also likely to be withdrawn at no distant date.

Ottawa, May 10.—There will be no tariff changes before the budget speech is delivered next session. This is certain in spite of reports in leading government organs that tariff changes are now under consideration, and are likely to be announced before the provincial election in Saskatchewan.

The attractions and advantages offered by new Brunswick formed the speaker's theme and his remarks were illustrated with lantern slides.

HOT SHOT FOR HON. MR. LANDRY

Has One Story For the Platform, The Opposite in Reports of Department

(Richibucto Review.)

We wish to call the attention of the electors of Kent county to a few of the misleading statements to be found in the minister of agriculture's speech.

In discussing the decline in the number of cheese and butter factories, he said: "This decline is due to the indiscriminate subsidizing of factories by the old government."

In the report of his own department, signed and approved by himself, we find the following: "The advent of the farm cream separator is responsible for much of the decrease in the number of factories. The hand separator makes butter making at home easier and to that coupled with the increase in value of sweet skimmed milk over whey, the falling off in cheese can largely be attributed."

Let the reader compare the two statements given above. In so doing, the question must flash across one's mind: When was Doctor Landry telling the truth? Was it when he spoke in the legislature, or was it when he signed the report which contained the last statement cited above? At one time or the other, his statements were at variance with the truth.

And still another statement made by the minister of agriculture which goes to prove beyond a doubt that he has no respect for the facts contained in his own departmental records, is to be found in the following taken from his recent speech: "The reports show that farmers keep more milk cows than formerly, hence the greater production of butter."

While the minister of agriculture states that there has been an increase in number of cows, on page 109 of the agricultural report of 1911, he writes: "There has been a shrinkage in the number of milk cows in the province." Which one of the two statements is the lie?

Would it not be well for the minister of agriculture, in future, to look more carefully into his printed report before he undertakes to make a speech.





THE DRUMMOND WORKS

John J. Drummond of Montreal, his chief engineer, Mr. Parsons and J. P. Edwards, manager of the Londonderry, N. S. plant, who were in the city yesterday, left this morning for Londonderry, via Digby. Mr. Drummond said that the work at his mines in Gloucester is progressing very rapidly. Their railway line connecting with the docks has been extensively used for lumber and general business in addition to their own work. One of the finest shipping docks in America with a capacity of 1,000 tons an hour has been erected at Bathurst. Development work at the mines has been carried on all winter and 80,000 tons are ready for shipment. A concentrating plant for standardizing the ore will commence operations next week and shipments will commence about the 20th.

Mr. Edwards said yesterday that the management had not come to any decision about a proposal to remove their plant to St. John from Londonderry.
