HUGH CAMPBELL'S BENEFTT

Judgment Reserved

The case of Robert Campbell vs. Donaldson Bros., which was commenced yesterday morning before Mr. Justice McKeown, was continued in the afternoon in the Admiralty Chambers. The plaintiff was invited on November 23, while working on the steamship "Almora." He claims \$10,000 damages. At the afternoon session Dr. Baxter and H. C. Schofield gave evidence. This concluded the case for the plaintiff.

F. R. Taylor, in opening for the defence moved for judgment on the ground that no case had been made out by the plaintiff.

J. B. M. Baxter here said that he had abandoned his claim under the "Workman's Compensation Act."

Mr. Taylor based his motion on the following points: First—Contributory negligence on the part of the plaintiff; second, the accident, the action must be brought against the principal or against the immediate actors in the wrong; third, there is no evidence of negligence on the part of anyone.

Steamer Sixty Miles Out at One
O'clock Today--Expected About
H. H. PICKETT IN

C. P. R. liner Montreal, Captain R. H. McNeill, from London and Antwerp is expected here about 5 o'clock this evening. At 1 o'clock she was sixty miles away. The steamer is bringing out 354 passengers,—one cabin, and 353 steerage. A wireless message to the Times-Star at 1 o'clock from the Montreal, announced that she had met with terrific weather. From Crook Haven, South of Ireland, the steamer had the roughest kind of weather, and when off Cape Race ran into a blizzard. Many of her passengers suffered from sea-sickness and for days at a time did not make their appearance on deck.


