

Guelph Endorses Policies of Maritime Province Envoys

McKenna Hears Renewed Suggestions That St. John Should Send Out Solicitors To Canvass For Trade

The resolution was moved by F. Friedeman, of the Sterling Rubber Company, who declared that the case as presented for the Maritime Provinces was clear-cut to admit of any questions.

FAVOR USING N. S. COAL

William Berry, of the Dominion Linen Company, was another who expressed his whole-hearted support of the case for Canadian ports.

W. J. Tiller, Baltimore Hats Company, also spoke for his firm and voiced the sentiments that nothing but Canadian ports should be used.

Still another suggestion was made by a group of men who gathered around me. They inquired just why some effort could not be made to get coal from Nova Scotia to Ontario.

MORE ASSURANCES OF SUPPORT

"My firm uses ten thousand tons of coal per year," said another, "and if it could be delivered here on any fair basis, we could use Maritime coal."

C. J. Jordan, of the Scythes Company, with branches in Montreal, Toronto and Winnipeg, was another who assured The Telegraph-Journal representative that he was with us on the Canadian port question.

After the dinner was concluded, it was most interesting to hear the encouraging views of many who came up, and to whom it was introduced. There was not one dissenting voice in the chorus raised, and The Telegraph-Journal was the subject of many flattering remarks as to its enterprise in sending speakers out to give their version of Maritime difficulties.

INVITED TO SPEAK AGAIN

In fact, I have been asked if I will return some other time and speak along similar lines to the Canadian Club members. Just at this point Colonel "Bill" Simpson, Secretary of the Guelph Chamber of Commerce, telephoned me to say that they all wished me every success on my mission, and promised to write me at St. John.

J. I. McIntosh, owner of the Guelph Mercury, met me this afternoon and after "listening in" gave as his very definite opinion that we had all the best of the argument. The Mercury had representatives at the dinner tonight to comment on our case, and it will be favorable.

FINDS NO FORCE USED

Once again has the view been impressed on me that unless there is rank deception somewhere—and I can find no reason for suspecting it—the body of shippers forcing shipments through Portland has no foundation in fact. I have not found one single shipper who is not willing to use Canadian ports, all things being equal.

They point out, of course, that in shipments to some unusual points of delivery, they must find ships routed that way. But in respect to straight cargoes or for goods bound for regular ports of call, there has been no loud outcry for any United States ports.

SOLICITOR SUGGESTION RENEWED

At Guelph, as elsewhere, it has been suggested to your representative that it will be well for our ports to follow up the splendid advertising they are getting by appointing men, good men, to get after business.

Times are quiet here, but there is the conviction that things will be better. However, it seems to me, after talking to many big producers at various points, that difficulties have brought home to all the need of pulling together from one end of Canada to the other.

Over 300 years ago King James conferred upon the Province of Nova Scotia an exclusive Coat of Arms. It shows the unicorn rampant and an Indian chief supporting a shield containing St. Andrew's Cross overtopped with a mailed helmet-visor and hands clasped in friendship under the tialist. The motto is "Munir Haec et altera Vincit". The Coat of Arms was conferred upon the Province of Nova Scotia, which then comprised what is now N. S., N. B., P. E. I., and part of the State of Maine. It is interesting to note that the Maritime Life Assurance Company has adopted this Coat of Arms and it appears on all their policy forms.
