

HOW MUCH DID THE TORIES GET?

The Conservatives are making wild assertions about the use of American money by Liberals, to cover their own operations with funds subscribed by the United States trusts. The Ottawa Journal, which is supporting Mr. Borden, had the following in a letter from New York:—

"It is currently reported here (New York,) and accepted as true, that more than \$1,000,000 has been subscribed by the big trusts for use in the Canadian elections. 'Big Business' is undoubtedly opposed to the ratification of the proposed Reciprocity agreement and now seeks to influence the electorate of Canada."

TRADE WILL STILL GO ON EAST AND WEST

C. P. R. Has Every Promise of Continued Big Business—The Position of Its Stock

(J. C. Macintosh & Co.'s Circular)

The recent decline in the common stock of the Canadian Pacific Railway is certainly not due to any weakness in the position of the company, so far as can be ascertained from any published figures, or from any conditions which prevail in Canada. It may possibly be that the stock was bought too high, recently, when it went to nearly \$200 per share, and if so, the decline which is now taking place would have been brought about sooner or later in any case. It is most likely, however, that the reduction in price is due to conditions in Germany, inasmuch as the selling is largely from that quarter. Whether or not the war talk is occasioning the selling would be interesting to know. Local financiers, however, consider it rather strange that the selling should appear at a time when the rest of the world seems of the opinion that war possibilities are over.

C. P. R. it should be remembered, had a very sharp advance during the present year. Early in the year the stock was selling at around \$107 per share, so that the advance to the high level was about 80 points. This advance was a logical one, following as it did the increase in dividend from 8 per cent. to 10 per cent. The subsequent decline has only been in the vicinity of 20 points. The last big break was in 1907. Early that year the stock had sold up to \$183. Before the panic was over, the price fell away 35 points, selling at \$148, a figure which has never been duplicated since early in 1908.

AT THE PRESENT TIME THE EARNINGS ARE LARGER THAN DURING THE CORRESPONDING PERIOD OF ANY YEAR IN THE ENTIRE PREVIOUS HISTORY OF THE ROAD. THERE IS EVERY REASON TO BELIEVE THAT DURING THE COMING FEW MONTHS THEY WILL EXCEED ALL PREVIOUS RECORDS FOR ANY SEASON OF THE YEAR, MORE ESPECIALLY IN VIEW OF THE FACT THAT THE CROP NOW BEING HARVESTED IS THE LARGEST IN THE HISTORY OF CANADA.

RUSSIAN PREMIER SUCCUMBS

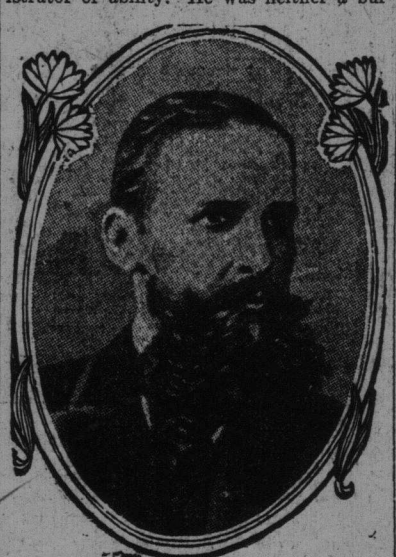
Stolypin Dies of Injuries Inflicted Upon Him By Assassin

WAS AN ABLE MAN

Had Been Twice Before Victim of Attempt at Murder—Had Used Strong Hand in Suppressing Revolutionary Movements in Russia

Kiev, Russia, Sept. 18.—Premier Stolypin who was shot by an assassin Friday evening in a theatre, died last evening.

Peter A. Stolypin was a tall handsome man of fifty-five years. His short cropped hair was gray but his beard was dark. He has been described generally as an administrator of ability. He was neither a bur-

caut man or a reactionary in the ordinary sense of those terms, and had been said to have been imbued with liberalism but determined to put down the revolutionary movements at any cost.

As governor of Saratov he took such steps against the terrorists and liberals alike as won him the designation of the "Iron Minister." He was appointed prime minister by imperial ukase on July 22, 1906, and stamped out the revolution that had grown to threatening proportions during the premiership of M. Witte and which Stolypin's successor, M. Goremykin had not been able to control.

Stolypin was a man of great energy and was a victim of a bomb which killed three persons and exploded at his home. The minister escaped with slight injuries, but two of his children were wounded. As minister of the interior preceding the premiership, M. Stolypin came into conflict with the Duma and when he made his first speech before that body he was greeted with cries of "murderer."

The opposition hatred of Stolypin reached a crisis last March when he was elected to the Duma, having rejected his bill for the establishment of the zemstvo or local government in the western provinces, the premier resigned and contented to resume office only when the emperor agreed to dissolve the Duma and promulgate the measure under the authority of the fundamental law.
