

PARIS HOTELS HAVE NO MORE ROOM

Thousands of Tourists from U. S. Seek Places — Lack of Ships Checking Influx.

Paris, May 27.—Great difficulties are being encountered by Paris hotels in providing accommodations for the thousands of American tourists who are flocking to this city. Many hostels are booked up until late in July, and many Americans who have failed to make arrangements for accommodations arrive to find all hotels, large and small, crowded. A woman entered the office of a steamship company yesterday and reported she had visited twenty-one hotels without being able to find a room.

Officers of a French tourist company stated a few days ago that the situation was being relieved through offers of rooms from smaller hotels, and it was said that 2,000 had been promised. Hotel managers, however, are less optimistic and state they do not know how to care

for Americans arriving in this country. Another factor that is expected to restrict European travel this summer is the lack of shipping facilities. There are from forty to fifty ships now in service between American and French ports and these, at the outside, can carry from 12,000 to 13,000 persons to Europe each month. Since the months of heaviest eastward bound travel are May, June, July and August, steamship company officials estimate the number of tourists making the voyage will be far short of the estimated 100,000 who are expected to visit France this summer. Most steamships are reported to be booked to capacity for September and October and staterooms have been reserved on ships sailing as late as December.

TWO DEAD, THIRTY HURT IN WRECK

Albuquerque, N. M., May 26.—Santa Fe passenger train No. 808, due to arrive here at 6.30 p. m., was wrecked yesterday at Lajoya, 52 miles south of here, due to a spread track, resulting from high water. The engineer and fireman were killed and about 30 passengers injured.
