HALIFAX, May 29.—A son of Henry Hyland, of Liverpool, Queens County died on Monday, and another on Tuesday. The others are seriously ill. All the cases exhibited symptoms of poisoning. It is thought the water from a well is responsible for sickness and death. An investigation is under way.
