Walter Bates, a lunatic, choked to death on Wednesday while eating his dinner at the hotel in Toronto.

The Minister of the Interior and several other officials of the Brazilian Republic have resigned and the political situation is becoming worse every day.

The Exchange Telegraph Company says that Andrew Carnegie has been invited to become Lord Rector of Aberdeen University in succession to Prof. Stuart.

Dr. Amos P. Dodge of Oneida, N. Y., said Wednesday that the symptoms of the young son of Burt Yagler were unmistakably those of anthrax, the disease which has been killing off live stock in the vicinity of the boy's home.

On Sunday morning a polled Angus bull belonging to John Schar, a German, of Ellisboro, N. W. T., broke out of the fence and went along with the herd of cattle which were being tended to by Mr. Schar's daughter.

Practically no clue has been obtained to the perpetrators of the \$840,000 robbery at the Selby Smelting Works, San Francisco.

A panic was narrowly averted in Westminster Abbey Sunday evening. The host of an American lady, who was seated in the choir, came in contact with a wax candle.

MOURNING THE EMPRESS

London, Aug. 8.—A resolution providing for an address of condolence with King Edward and sympathy with Emperor William in his bereavement.

Mr. Balfour, the Government leader, in moving the resolution, highly eulogized the exemplary life of the daughter-in-law and mother, who, throughout her life, strove to the utmost to promote mutual comprehension and sympathy between two great nations upon whom so much of the future of civilization depends.

Berlin, Aug. 8.—It has been definitely decided that the funeral of the Dowager-Empress Frederick will take place Tuesday next, August 13.

CANADA LIVE STOCK

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—E. B. Elderkin, superintendent of the Canadian live stock exhibit at Buffalo, had a conference with the Minister of Agriculture yesterday morning, and explained the character of the live stock exhibit which the Northwest Territory has resolved to make at Buffalo.

Ontario Cows Lead at Buffalo. Toronto, Aug. 8.—The Agricultural Department have received good reports in connection with the cows from Ontario, which are competing in the dairy test at the Pan-American.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—A cable message was handed out by the Militia Department, which has been received by the Governor-General from the Hon. Joseph Chamberlain, Secretary of State for the Colonies. It reads: "I am glad to hear that your son, William John Adam Walker, is a member of the South African Constabulary, has been reported accidentally wounded at Pretoriusburg, on July 21. Eye removed." (Signed), Chamberlain.

Attempted Arson at Ottawa. Ottawa, Aug. 8.—William Glasner, a Swede, who is better known as Gleason, and who resides in Janville, was arrested by the county police on Monday night, on the charge of attempting to set fire to his house, in which were sleeping his seven children. The police were informed of the alleged attempt to commit arson by his wife. She told them that, during Monday night, her husband had twice endeavored to burn their house down.

The Fall Killed Him. Vankleek Hill, Ont., Aug. 8.—A most regrettable accident occurred a few miles from here Monday evening, when D. N. Fraser, a young man of about 23 years, was fatally injured. He was driving a load of hay from the field, when a wheel upset, throwing him heavily to the ground. His spine was severely injured and when picked up he was paralyzed and had lost all sensation from his shoulders down. He died Wednesday morning.

Canada Seeking Direct Trade. London, Aug. 8.—The Canadian Commissioner, who was sent to South Africa to report on the possibility of developing trade with that country direct, without traversing New York and London, has advised the sending of agents to the Cape for the purpose of stimulating the demand for Canadian goods. It is stated that Sir Wilfrid Laurier, the Canadian Premier, intends to adopt the suggestion.

MR. TARTE'S PLANS

Conference Mooted to Consider Transportation Questions. TO DISCUSS THE WHOLE SUBJECT

Minister of Public Works has invited the Railway and Navigation Companies to send Representatives to a Meeting in Montreal Within the Next Few Days—The Census Returns.

Ottawa, Aug. 8.—Asked yesterday if there was any new development in the transportation question, Hon. J. Israel said: "Well, I have invited the railway and navigation companies to send representatives to a conference to be held in Montreal Friday. We will start for Montreal in the course of the next few days to discuss the whole subject. The railway companies say that the navigation companies charge rates so exorbitant that the former have to carry at a loss the business which they receive from the latter. There is no money in it for them. I have written to the navigation companies, asking if that statement is correct. We will get to the bottom of the difficulties that stand in the way of our solving the transportation problem and do our best to remove them. I am hoping the conference proposed will be productive of the very best results. The Harbor Commissioners have been asked to furnish a general plan, showing what improvements they consider to be necessary at Montreal, and this will be of great use to us if it is forthcoming, as I have no doubt it will be. Geographically speaking, we have been wonderfully blessed by Providence. We have within our own territory the great natural waterway to the ocean from the west, and what have we done to avail ourselves of it? We have been blind to our opportunities for many years, but this must not be allowed to continue. This season 40,000,000 bushels of Canadian grain was shipped from the west—Canadian grain, recollect. How many million bushels of that will come to Montreal? A paltry five million. The rest will go by American channels to American ports. What is the remedy? We must develop the French River route and other available channels. The press can do a great work in educating public opinion upon this question, and I look to the press to help.

A Non-Political Demonstration. Hon. Mr. Tarte will attend the great annual festival of the French Canadians at Memramook, N. B., on August 21st, and will deliver an address. As the occasion is a non-political one he will be accompanied by Mr. Frank, Conservative member for Jacques Cartier, and Hon. L. O. David, Beique and J. X. Perreault will also be of the party.

On his return Mr. Tarte will complete a personal examination of the French River route by descending the Ottawa River from Mattawa in a canoe.

The Census Returns. The statement sent from Ottawa that the population of Canada is 5,300,000 cannot, according to the census officials, be correct, as the returns from several districts, including remote parts of the Northwest, have not yet been received. The statement about the 15th instant, but even that will be subject to later revision.

AID TO NEW COLONIES. Land to be Purchased to Enable Volunteers to Seattle—Native Labor Laws to be Altered.

London, Aug. 8.—The House of Commons Tuesday night discussed a vote of £25,000,000 in aid of a grant in aid of the Transvaal and Orange River Colonies. Sir William Vernon Harcourt and others severely criticized the government's measures.

Le cause, Bethune claimed, the judge admitted evidence which he should not have done. If a new trial was not granted, then Mr. Bethune asked, under section 744, for a fiat to appeal to the Supreme Court. The grounds on which Mr. Bethune bases his case are purely technical.
