MAJOR WALLER ON PHILIPPINE FIGHTING

Ordered to Kill All Insurgents Caught Armed or Who Refused to Surrender.

San Francisco, June 13.-Major L. W. T. Waller, United States Marine corps, by far the most interesting personage to reach here on the transport Warren,

I received both verbal and written orders from Gen. Jacob Smith to kill all insurgents who were caught armed or who refused to surren-

"It was the only thing that could be ne, and I never questioned General Smith's orders, with one exception. This exception I refuse to state. A fair estimate of the number of natives killed by the men of my command would be four or five hundred. These were all killed in battle, with the exception of 11 carriers, who were tried by courtmartial and shot. There was only one woman shot, and she was only slightly wounded.
