**GEORGE GEE IS A MURDERER.**  
His Victim Died at 6 o'clock This Morning.  
Assassin Shows Signs of Remorse— Says He is Willing to Swing For His Deed.

WOODSTOCK, N. B., March 15.—George Gee, who was shot with a rifle by his cousin, George Gee, at New Canaan, thirty miles from here, last Sunday morning, died as the result of the wound this morning at six o'clock. The prisoner, who is in the goal here on a charge of shooting with intent to kill, will now be charged with murder, following the coroner's inquest, which will probably be held at once. The coroner will probably be Dr. Cummins of Bath.

VIGO, Spain, March 15.—Emperor William and King Alfonso lunched today on board the Spanish royal yacht Giralda. Emperor William subsequently sailed to Gibraltar on board the North German Lloyd steamer Koenig Albert.

**FASHIONABLE WEDDING.**

MONTREAL, March 15.—The marriage took place this afternoon of Marguerite, youngest daughter of Hon. G. W. Stephens to Capt. A. Hamilton Gault, of the Royal Scots, and son of the late A. F. Gault.

**RUSSIAN CAPT. SHOT AS A SPY.**  
He Was Giving Military Secrets to the Japanese.  
Japan Raising a "Colossal War Fund"—All is Quiet Around Port Arthur.

PORT ARTHUR, March 15.—Everything is quiet here. There is no sign of the enemy. Advice from Feng Shuan Cheng (about 45 miles northwest of Wifu), says the Russian troops are showing an admirable spirit in surmounting the difficulties and hardships of the march over the frozen tracks of East Manchuria.

**A TRAITOR SHOT.**  
ST. PETERSBURG, March 15, 1.30 p. m.—Captain Ivkov of the Manchurian commissariat service has been summarily court-martialed and shot for acting as a spy in the pay of the Japanese. When arrested on suspicion of espionage documents found in Ivkov's possession left no doubt of the truth of the charges that he had long been revealing military secrets to the Japanese. The tragic story became public through a simple announcement in the army organ this morning that Ivkov had been executed from the service.

**"JAPAN'S WAR FUND."**  
TOKYO, March 15.—The cabinet after a conference with the elder statesmen and other political leaders, has decided to submit proposals for the extension of the tobacco monopoly to include manufactured tobacco and the creation of a salt monopoly to a special diet convening on Friday next. This will involve a heavy outlay for the purchase of private tobacco manufacturing concerns and the salt interest, but the advisers of the government regard the expenditure at the time as wise.

**IN ST. PETERSBURG.**  
ST. PETERSBURG, March 15, 5.50 p. m.—The reports of the abandonment of Port Arthur continue to excite the bitterest resentment, the newspapers denouncing the story as a stock jobbing scheme. One paper remarks: "Let other countries be fed on such tales, but while Russian blood flows the authorities should not allow the people to be disturbed by such a false report. The official telegrams are believed and trusted by everyone."

**EXPULSED FROM GERMAN EMPIRE.**  
Russian Students in Germany Charged With Anarchy.  
They Protested Against Being Spied Upon and are Thrown Out of the Country.

BERLIN, March 15.—Thirty Russian students, several of them women, have received yesterday and today from the police, notices of expulsion, in consequence of participating in a meeting held Saturday in protest against the government's permitting Russian police agents to watch Russian residents in Germany. The students have from three to eight days in which to leave the country and may select the frontier to cross, the government not compelling them to return to Russia.

**WANTED A CHANGE FROM NEWSPAPER WORK.**  
English Reporter Desired a Respectable Job, so the Magistrate Set Him to Breaking Stone.

Newspaper men are ubiquitous, at least His Honor Magistrate Ritchie insisted so in the police court this morning. This complaint was dropped during the examination of one who gave his name as William J. Pickersgill, who claims England as his home, and says he came out here on the Lake Manitoba, which docked on Sunday. The police swore that William has been here several days before the arrival of the steamer, and the defendant claimed he was a newspaper reporter, hence the magistrate's remark.
