The International Commission on use of the waterways of the St. John River met again this morning in the Equity Court rooms in the Pugsley Building.

When they started this work they had the charts of the survey taken after the Treaty of 1842, which were completed in 1845. They located the line on the St. John River by these charts.

Copies of the charts were produced and identified, and the witness explained that they were copies of the British charts made for the American Government. On the survey they used the British and American charts alternately. Maps No. 9 to 15, which were placed in evidence, showed the boundary from the eastern corner of the State of Maine to the River St. Francis.
