ST. JOHNS, Nfid., Aug. 22—In a letter to the Earl of Crew, principal secretary of state for the colonies, the chairman of the Anglo-American Cable Company, B. A. Bevan, defends the recent repudiation by Sir Edward Morris' ministry, of concessions made by Sir Robert Bond's ministry to the Commercial Cable Company. He says that the concessions would have amounted to a 25 years' monopoly of all cable messages passing over the government land lines in favor of the American concern and to the prejudice of the Anglo-American company, a long established British corporation.

He reviews the history of the case in detail, setting forth points which he maintains constituted a monopoly in favor of the Commercial Cable Company. It was in the face of those facts he concluded, that the new ministry of Sir Edward Morris declined to ratify the agreement with the Commercial Cable Company.
