NEWS FROM SASKATCHEWAN. Heavy Immigration into Western Canada. Mr. J. Bruce Walker, Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, reports that statistics compiled to date show that for the first eight months of 1911 immigration into Western Canada totals 276,737. Many of these new settlers are prosperous farmers from the United States, who have sold their valuable farms there and have bought cheaper land in Western Canada. A large proportion of them have secured farms in the agricultural province of Saskatchewan, where they will make their homes in future.

Wonderful Increase in Railway Mileage. In the year 1892 Saskatchewan had but 748 miles of railway. The subsequent development of this great province, however, due to the remarkable fertility of its agricultural lands, has been extremely rapid and completed statistics for 1910 show that at the end of that year the province possessed 3350 miles of railway. This is probably the greatest percentage in increase of railway mileage of any province in the Dominion. Many Banks in Western Canada. Figures which speak eloquently of the progress of Western Canada are those relating to the establishment of branches of the Dominion chartered banks. In 1901 the three provinces of Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta possessed 71 banks among them but in ten years a remarkable increase has taken place and up to July 1911 the three provinces possessed 471 banks. The greatest increase has taken place in the Province of Saskatchewan which now has 285 banks.

This central Saskatchewan city continues to make progress and reports just to hand show that five more large buildings are to be erected early in 1912, which will mean an expenditure of at least \$500,000. New York, Oct. 24.—Liverpool reported a weak market this morning with prices 7 1/2 to 10 points below a parity with our closing. Cables stated that the decline was caused by freer offerings of the actual staple and less favorable Manchester reports. In sympathy with these reports an anticipation of a bearish spinning report tomorrow our market opened 7 1/2 to 11 points down but the bear interests showed some disposition to reduce their lines over the bureau report on the theory that a showing of 7,000,000 to 8,000,000 bales ginned had been distributed. While reflecting a very bearish general sentiment the market showed considerable resistance because of the strength in technique. The general short interest is enormous and seems to be generally increasing on the strong spots. LITTLE LIFE IN THE STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 24.—In the absence of an impelling motive for trading on either side of the stock market today, movements were of the petty, petulant characters of recent sessions. Trading in fact fell to even smaller proportions, with a total of 185,000 shares for the day's business. With each day it becomes more apparent that public interest in the market is not being aroused. Outside participations is as small as at almost any time during the year, which has been marked by the indifference of the country at large to ward events in Wall Street. Moreover, the larger interests which might be in position to give the market a decided bent apparently are refraining from activity until they are able to forecast the outcome of present political and industrial conditions more closely. Trading consequently is restricted largely to professional operations. The standard stocks ended the day just about where they began it. Changes were so small that they could be said to indicate no trend in either direction. Reading Missouri Pacific and Norfolk and Western were the only railroad stocks to manifest decided strength. Among the less active stocks movements were wider, and some of the industrial exhibited marked weakness. New York Air Brake fell five points to 45—its lowest price in many years. In an official statement it was said that the business of the company was improving, but no mention was made of the declaration of the dividend on the stock. American Cotton Oil fell more than two points on expectations of a poor annual report. Strength of the Western resulted from a continuation of the buying of this stock, which has been noted for some time. In this connection there was a report that the dividend is to be increased. Missouri Pacific's strength was laid to covering of shorts put out at the time of publication of the report.

London took only a small part in the day's trading. Transactions for London securities were limited to 8,000 shares, largely on the selling side. Foreign lending by the banks continued on a heavy scale, and the purchase and exchange of which to make the advances abroad raised the rate for sight sterling to the highest point of the year. This brought the market for the combined figures of 18 months to the level of 1897. It would be possible to export gold should the Bank of France offer advantageous terms. The first of the autumn market was fairly active today, which was balanced by an increase in expenses of almost the same amount. The annual report of the Rock Island Railroad showed a heavy gain in expenses, although it was more than balanced by the increase in earnings. The report of the Erie and Ontario, which is the only one of the country to a few months ago at least, increased their expenses was shown in 10 per cent, but their operating revenue gained less than 1 per cent, and the net result was a loss of four per cent. Only eleven roads revealed a reduction in expenses.

Transactions in bonds, both on and outside of the stock exchange, continue on such a scale as to attract attention. Private sales in some instances are reported as heavier than for some months. Bonds were relatively more active on the exchange today than were stocks, and they showed a tendency to rise. Total sales, par value, \$2,680,000. U. S. Bonds were unchanged on call.

ONE OF NEW YORK'S PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24.—Hitting great Mathewson to all corners the field, the Philadelphia Athletics defeated the New York Giants 5-1 this afternoon for the third successive time by a score of two to one, and the American League champions now need a single game to again give them the year in succession.
