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CANADIAN FISHERIES
FIRST NEAR
FISHERIES

Dominion Leads World in
This Branch of
Industry.

HON. J. D. HAZEN
AT VANCOUVER

Minister of Marine Says If
United States does not
Soon Ratify Agreement
Regarding Boundary
Fisheries, Canada will
Withdraw.

(Vancouver News-Advertiser, Wed., Aug. 26.)

An important announcement on the fisheries treaty entered into between Canada and the United States in April, 1908, was the leading feature of Hon. J. D. Hazen's address to the Canadian Club yesterday. The Minister of Marine declared that if the recommendations of the Joint Commission appointed to inquire into fishery conditions along the boundary waters were not put into effect by the U. S. government at the next session Canada would withdraw altogether from the treaty. The Canadian government had given effect to the findings of the Commission in 1910.

Object of His Trip.

Mr. Hazen said the object of his present trip was to investigate at first hand the fishery conditions on this coast. He had been up the Skeena river, had visited the Queen Charlotte Islands, had gone to the Yukon and Vancouver Island, and had been through yet. He explained the work apportioned to the three branches of his department. The naval defence branch had not along to do with the Niobe and the Rainbow. It had the management of the fishery protection fleet, the hydrographic survey, tidal survey, wireless telegraph, aids to navigation, and other matters. The marine branch had charge of the administration of the Canadian Shipping Act, such bills as the Department of the St. Lawrence channel from Montreal to the sea, the administration of the different harbor commissions, etc. The fisheries branch dealt with the fisheries on the coasts, the Great Lakes and on inland rivers and lakes.

Canada's Marine.

Canada's marine ranked tenth in the world and her fisheries first. In 1912 there were 8,360 vessels of 836,000 net tonnage registered in the Dominion. Many vessels registered in Great Britain, piled in Canadian waters. I estimated that 50,000 men and boys found employment in the fishery in Canadian waters. Turning to aids to navigation he found a rapid increase in the number. In 1868 there were only 200 lights for the guidance of mariners, while today there were 1,800 lights and 1,000 keepers. At the time British Columbia entered the Union there were only two lighthouses in British Columbia, and neither was in northern waters. Now there are 135 shore lights, 31 aids, one lightship and many other aids.

The policy of the department, the speaker declared, was to make navigation in Canadian waters as safe as it could possibly be made. Parliament had never been niggardly in voting money for this purpose. He referred to the increase in life-saving stations along this coast. Permanent crews are engaged during the winter and their numbers would be increased. In 1874 there were only 31 vessels registered in this province. In December last there were 1,376 vessels of a tonnage of 136,819. He hoped to see shipbuilding industry flourish on this coast, and that on both coasts steel ships would soon be built.

Long Coastline.

On the Atlantic Canada had 5,600 miles of coastline and on the Pacific 7,600 miles, almost double that of Great Britain and Ireland. In addition Canada's portion of the Great Lakes amounted to 72,000 square miles.

NEWCASTLE'S SCOTT ACT
INSPECTOR LEAVES

Newcastle, Aug. 26.—At the town council meeting last night Henry Broecker resigned as Scott Act inspector to take effect Aug. 31st.

CONDENSED

Two Men Attempting to Swim English Channel—Third Degree Discussed by American Lawyers.

Swimming English Channel.

Dover, Eng., Aug. 26.—Henry F. Sullivan, a long distance swimmer, of Lowell, Mass., started this morning on his first attempt to swim the English Channel, a feat hitherto accomplished only by the late Captain Matthew Webb in 1875, and by Wm. T. Burgess, an Englishman by birth, but a naturalized French citizen, on Sept. 6, 1911.

London, Aug. 26.—The news of the truce between the militant suffragettes and the British government evidently has not reached the districts outside of London, as a fine country house in the suburban town of Finchley was burnt down early this morning by suffragette sympathizers. They left a quantity of suffrage literature among the ruins. The place was occupied only by a caretaker, the family having gone away for the summer.

Murdered by Mexicans.

Mexico City, Aug. 26.—The murder of Arthur Lawton, a British subject, and Eric Von Thaden, a German, on Senator Eduardo Turbules' ranch in Western Michoacan is officially reported. The British minister has sent notifications to his home office.
