SOLDIERS' COMFORT ASSOCIATION MEETING.

The sum of \$137.76 donated to the S.C.A. in the days since Christmas seems to show that the spirit of giving was not exhausted during the Christmas season. This was the amount on hand as stated by the treasurer of the S.C.A., at the monthly meeting of this association held at Centenary parlors yesterday afternoon. Mrs. David McLean, the third vice-president, was in the chair. After the regular business of the minutes the treasurer also reported the expenses for the month as follows: \$875 for yarn, \$300 to the tobacco fund and \$300 paid out for boxes.

Branch reports were then given as follows: Girls' Circle, President Miss Edna Logan—This was the first formal branch among young girls and has done much splendid work. They reported having received letters from the boys in France to whom they sent parcels.

The Alexandria Circle, Mrs. Harrison president, made \$115.92 at a Christmas sale and sent parcels to No. 1 Field Ambulance Column. Letters of thanks have been received from the St. John men attached to that column.

East St. John Circle also has had letters from those to whom their parcels were sent.

West St. John Circle shipped 167 packages and has heard from the soldiers who received them.

In answer to the sock appeal sent out in the first of January 1,000 pairs of socks have been sent in and \$166.50 to purchase socks. This appeal will be continued throughout January as it is hoped to send 5,000 pairs.

FERRY WILL NEED ABOUT \$16,000 THIS YEAR

Falling Off in Revenue Responsible for Substantial Increase in Street Repairs

The ferry estimates were council yesterday morning adopted. The estimates for total \$26,565.46, about \$4,000 more than last year, made up at end of 1916, \$5,641.45 counts for 1916 \$7,399.21 of expenditure of \$10,521 above receipts for 1917.
