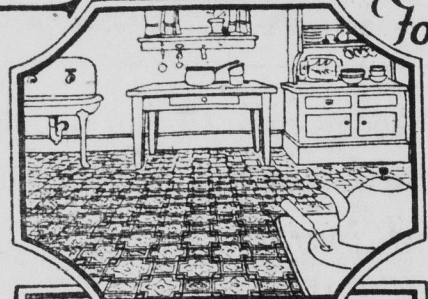

GRAND TRUNK TO
BE TURNED OVER
TO GOVERNMENT

Directors Decide to Ratify the Agreement for the Transfer.

ELEVEN YEARS IN
PURGATORY, HE SAYS

Chairman Smithers Fought All the Way Through for Shareholders' Interests.

London, May 12.—At the meeting of the shareholders of the Grand Trunk Railway Company today, it was decided to ratify the agreement between the management and the Canadian Government, which provides for the transfer of the control of the railway to the government this month.

Only three dissenting votes were cast. The meeting was crowded but quiet. The speech of the chairman of the board of directors of the railway, Sir Alfred Smithers, dealt with the position of the company exhaustively and was listened to without elation.

An amendment to defer ratification until there was a better guarantee concerning future action by the Canadian government was withdrawn. The chairman remarking that they looked to public opinion in Canada and England to see fair play. This announcement was greeted with applause.

Thanks Government.

The first shareholder to speak was applauded when he expressed himself as truly grateful that the Canadian Government had put its foot down and had said further delay in regard to the acquisition of the road must cease. The speaker added that it looked as if the matter was being prolonged for what could be got out of the shareholders.

Sir Alfred was cheered when he said the speaker's last sentiment was most fitting.

"I have had eleven years purgatory," declared the chairman. "I yield to no man in the way I have fought for the rights of the shareholders."

Another speaker suggested the company should delay in presenting its case before the arbitration board appointed to fix the value of its shares. But the meeting was not inclined to agree with him, and soon showed impatience with others who, by speaking, delayed the matter.

Sir Alfred Smithers spoke of the intense surprise occasioned by the government's refusal to extend the time of the arbitration board. He remarked:

"The directors cannot conceal from the shareholders that the government has acted in a manner which could not be anticipated and judging from the reports of speeches made in the Canadian parliament there is considerable misapprehension as to the reasons of the present position of the company.

"I have purposely kept from making any premature announcement while negotiations were going on."

Judges Dislike
Own Settlement

Compelled to Favor Soviets Whose Principles Are Repudiated by Englishmen.

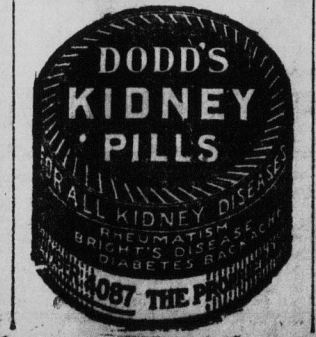
London, May 12.—The initial judges' decision affected by the British Government's tacit recognition of the Soviet Government as the de facto government of Russia, was rendered this afternoon when the Court of Appeal reversed a previous finding of the High Court in the disputed ownership of a quantity of ransom and other wood materials shipped from Russia under a contract made by Leonid Krassin, the Soviet trade commissary.

The goods concerned had been confiscated by the Soviet Government in 1919 and were sold to a firm of British importers last August.

All Changed Now

The British courts found the original owners entitled to the goods, as the Soviet Government had not been recognized by the British Government, and consequently had not the right of confiscation. The Court of Appeal found, however, that since the Soviet Government had been recognized as the de facto government of Russia, it was not within the jurisdiction of the British courts to consider the justice or morality of the confiscatory order.

"Although such principles," said the court, "are repudiated by the vast majority of the citizens of Great Britain and are not recognized by its laws."

Surf Satin Is A
Skirt Favorite

Canton Crepe for the More Dressy Ones—Panel Mode Finds Many Friends.

Surf satin is looming up with pronounced vigor in separate skirt circles, and is now recognized with equal consideration as the generally known cotton gartardine. Both of these fabrics of course are mediums for the expression of the popular priced skirt.

Money Voted.

The improved finish that is now accorded the surf satin this season has gone a long way in recommending it as a skirt fabric, along with the sturdy quality of its weave. It is reported that laundering does not diminish the lustre of the new material. The fabric, adding another point in its favor.

Manufacturers are developing the fabric in straight line skirts, with pocket devices as the chief source of ornamentation upon them. In models of little higher price, in which this fabric and better qualities of cotton gartardine are employed, the skirt effects are such as to suggest the use of the fabric in the skirt.

For the more dressy skirt, for wear with elaborate blouses or novelty sweaters, the vogue of crepe silk skirts is absolute. Canton crepe, in plain and fancy weaves, forms the majority of these skirts although crepe de chine too is in frequent use.

In the silk fabric, particularly the plain versions, pleated effects are used in large part. Barring the accordion pleat, every width and version of the pleat is brought into use for these skirts. In the wide striped crepes, the mode of utilizing the alternate stripes for under and over sections of wide pleats is particularly appropriate.

Complementing the mode of the skirt is the use of a separate skirt, fashioned of organdy or voile. These are grouped together, for they are accorded similar development. They form a favored mode of their composition, some designers placing graded tucks to range from pin width to even width, and covering the entire depth of the skirt. Some, on the other hand, use the voile mode, drawn work methods for embellishment, worked in some instances, in elaborate geometric figures.

The panel mode has found its way into separate skirt realms, and is used in all kinds of fabrics. None is more arresting than the oblique panel contrivance, developed in organdy.

Lamb a la Newburg.

Neck and breast are boiled, the stock is used for soup.
1 cup cream sauce.
1 tablespoon finely cut green peppers.
1 cup rice.
Cut the lamb into small pieces; cover with the cream sauce, which has been colored with 2 teaspoon carmel; add the green pepper and put in centre of platter. The rice is washed and boiled, and put around the meat. Dust the rice with paprika and sprinkle with chopped parsley.
