The Orientalists and Bonapartists.
(Paris July 29) Correspondence of the London Standard.

The feud between Montagu and Capulet can hardly be surpassed in bitterness the mutual and long standing hatred of Orientalists and Bonapartists, Republicans and Legitimists regard each other with contempt and dislike, and are quite ready to begin throat-cutting at the first fair opportunity.

The Athletes and Socialists of the Extreme Left are considered by the pious neoepiscopates of the excited Right much as the tawny followers of Mohammed were by the Crusaders—as no better than savages, and something worse than dogs, when it was something to exterminate.

The men of the 4th of September, from whom the last Imperial Government fled when Paris was captured by the news of Sedan, are objects of execration to the Bonapartists, who are at this moment engaged in venting their venom on the unucky and ill-fated Jules Ferry, but all these and other animosities are inferior in virulence to that existing between the representatives of the July Monarchy and the Second Empire. Paris has just been assailed by a lightning-boltheaded man by the name of the Prince of Orleans. The former is scandalized at the prominent position lately assumed by Ferry, and by their intimacy with the President of the Republic. Their very most ardent and retiring attitude while Mr. Thiers was in power rendered the change more remarkable. During the last few weeks and especially while Mr. Shah was here, they have been seen everywhere and usually in uniform.

They are, it is most probable that he feels sympathy with the July Monarchy, and that he likes the Prince, who are not deficient in the qualities of an aristocrat. Some people say that they have ideas put themselves forward in compliance with the advice of the Duc de Broglie, the dynastic partialities are no secret, and who thinks that to show themselves friendly to the army, and to the public, is more advantageous to their interests.

By whomsoever given, the advice seems judicious. It was not by keeping out of sight, by "being themselves," as the French say, that they managed to improve their chances. In all assemblies the luck is for the forward; and there seems no reason why, in the comparative quiet of the Assembly for a definite form of government, it is probable the largest number of voices would be got for the Orientalists. There would be more Republicans, certainly, but these would divide their suffrages among three or four different kinds of republic.

Terrific Thunder Storms in England—
Many Persons Killed by Lightning
Intense Heat.
(From the London Times, July 29.)

The thunder storm which visited Bath early yesterday morning has not been exceeded in violence since the memorable night when George III. died. Just before 2 o'clock the rain came down in torrents, carrying soil, stones and sand from the neighboring hills into the city. The lightning was almost incessant, and illuminated the city and adjoining hills very vividly. The greatest alarm prevailed among the inhabitants, the majority of whom left their beds. In the city and vicinity trees have been split up, houses damaged and cattle destroyed. The storm lasted about an hour. In Breston the storm broke out with tremendous fury about 7 o'clock. Mr. Finch followed dead, and in Grimsham, another neighboring township, three men were struck dead as they were returning from a hayfield in a cart. The same fate befell a man in Fulwood, who was walking on the bank of the river, and in some places 120. A young woman named Anne Taylor, who was proceeding some steps, when she was struck by the lightning and killed on the spot. Mr. T. Buckle, a retired Bradford merchant, was also struck and killed at Bramhope. In some parts of the town of Richmond, Yorkshire, the paving-stones were kicked up by the lightning. At Bolton, a number of hands who had assembled in a field belonging to the Cannon Street Mission School of Bolton Moor, were struck by the ground by the lightning. The number, Ennis and Lee, were found dead. The former had his cap set on fire,

his hair singed off, and his cheek badly burnt. Lee had also been struck on the back of the head. Singular to relate, with the exception of Ennis's cap, none of the clothing of the boys appeared to have been burnt. Shortly afterwards the rain, accompanied by hailstones of extraordinary size, began to descend, and for a quarter of an hour it seemed as if a water-pot had been turned in the West of Scotland the storm is described as the most severe one for half a century.

From the towers of Kirkcaldy, in Dumfriesshire, it is reported that, among other occurrences, the house was struck, and the property considerably damaged. At a farm in the neighborhood of Leamie, two milch cows stabled in a byre were instantaneously killed. The lightning played some strange tricks in the Burnworth district. At one house the bolt entered the roof near the eaves of the chimney-stack, and penetrated the ceiling of the four bedroom at the chimney-urn, making a puncture of an inch by a quarter of an inch. The bolt then passed for about a yard down the chimney-bread, making a clean cut that length, and about two inches broad, and the same depth. In the wall had other appearance of having been hollowed out to allow a gas-pipe to be embedded in the length being torn out. Having gone a yard in width, the lightning struck a picture frame and hurled it with great force against the opposite wall, a distance of about five yards, smashing the glass, and driving the picture into a crevice where the lightning made its exit. The frame mentioned has the "right" form of whilst the valentine which was framed, had the gold blackened and the paper surrounding the gilt had been blown away. The glass in the frame could not be found, with the exception of two small pieces about the size of an inch square, and these pieces bore strong signs of having been subject to an intense heat.
