out to be Inspector Hogemark of the Norwegian Police Force. Hogemark had been to Alberta in 1981 with his son's hockey team and had been given a tour of "K" Division Headquarters by Cst. Randy Miller (now stationed in Whitehorse, Yukon). On December 30, 1983, Bradshaw and Magotiaux were invited by Hogemark to spend the day with him at police headquarters in Stavanger.

Stavanger, with a population of 90,000, is a major seaport for the offshore drilling platforms in the North Sea. Hogemark explained that 160 officers police the city, as well as approximately 400 square miles of North Sea and mountain terrain. The oil companies look after most of the policing on the oil platforms, but the police must investigate all industrial accidents on the high

sea. The Stavanger police also search for lost hunters and enforce the wildlife hunting laws.

Policing in Stavanger appears to be very similar to here in Canada. However, the officers do not carry side arms. There were no murders or armed robberies in their area in 1983, and their major concern was road fatalities (five in 1983). Impaired driving laws are drastic. The limit is .04 with mandatory blood tests. The conviction for a first offence is 21 days in jail. The stiff laws against impaired driving reduce accidents and save lives.

Insp. Hogemark and the Norwegian hockey team plan to return to central Alberta in the spring of 1987.
