

Career week offers alternatives

Final preparations are quickly being made for Career Week '84. This is the second year that UNB and STU have organized a week of information, discussion and displays

about careers. What will I do after graduation? What career alternatives do I have? Where can I receive relevant information? How do I look for a job? What services are there to help me choose a career?

These are some of the questions that Career Week will address. Displays at the UNB Bookstore and at the Harriet Irving Library along with noon hour talks during the week will form the core of the activities.

The Career Centre located in the Alumni Memorial Building will be bustling with activity during the week.

Past experience has shown that the number of students receiving help for career counselling increases to over 80% at this time while there is a 60% plus increase in the utilization of the Career Library.

A three year grant from the Counselling Foundation of Canada made it possible for the Career Centre to expand in 1981. The University of New Brunswick assumed financial responsibility for the Career Centre so that it can continue to provide a needed service.

During the week the Career Week logo will be visible on the campus. The design represents the elements of the career search. The symbol as a whole reflects the path of action one needs to follow to zero in on a career. The points represent the steps involved in researching an appropriate starting point. The points too are representative of the many career decision making stops along the way. An upward arrow indicates a good start with upward progression.

Most important, the symbol contains the human figure - the people involved in the career decision making process.

Exchange stays open

Student Union President, John Bosnitch has announced that the student run Campus Services Exchange will stay open. In response to UNB President James Downey's order to close down, Bosnitch says that he is willing to meet with university representatives to discuss their request, but will not take action without an explanation of why the SUB Smoke Shoppe was not being treated in the same way. Full permission for the student store's activities was granted by the SUB Board of Directors with support from the administration representatives on the Board. In a letter to University officials, Beaver Foods representatives complained about the Exchange but made no mention of the Smoke Shoppe. Beaver officials insist that they have monopoly rights to the food and vending services on campus, but the Brunswickan has obtained copies of their contract referring specifically to
