### METRIC MEMO 'Odd' measures will not remain

By GERALD J. BLACK The Consumer Packaging and Labelling Act of 1971 made the state nent of quantity on all retail packaging in metric units mandatory for all products

Producers of non-food items were required to comp-ly with the law by September, 1975, while food items did not become subject until March, 1976

At any rate, that's why you find metric measures quoted on the packaging of virtually every item that you buy today. On many of the products the quantity is stated in both metric and imperial terms: A whipped cream dispenser reads 199 ml (7 fl. oz.); a milk carton states 284 ml (10 fl. oz.). Such "odd" measures as 199 ml and 284 ml will not remain. At present these manufacturers have simply taken existing imperial packaging and applied con-verted metric measures to

In time, revised packaging standards will be devised and you will find new package sizes which reflect "even"


